### " ONE MORE UNFORTUNATE."

Early Sunday morning Erie work-men who went to clear up the wreck caused by the ditching of several cars t the tannery curve on Dyke street, Wells ville, found the dead body of a man lying beside the track near bridge No. 9. The body was frightfully multilated, everything going to show that the man was killed by being run over by a train. Coronor Burdick, of this village, was at once summonded, and investigation readily established his iden-The remains proved to be those of

Harry Van Patten, of 190 Third street Olean. Among the papers found on his person was a discharge from the United States army, showing that he had enlisted therein, March 22, 1890, and was discharged at Columbus Barracks on June 19th of the same on a surgeon's certificate of disability. He had also been a member of the Knights of Labor, Assembly No. 1,607, East Syracuse. He had also been a member of the American Railway Union. His card of membership is signed by Eugene V. Debs; he is therein named as a switchman, his Local Union was No. 264. Among his belongings were a leaf from an autograph album on one page of which was the name, "Miss Libbie Ayers;" a letter of recommendation from R. M. Whitney, wagon hub manufacturer, Olean, in which high tribute was paid to the bearer, who had been five years in the service of the writer; a similar letter from J. W. Alexander, Superintendent for A. W. Morris, Bowers, Texas; still another from C. D. Pierce, coal dealer. Olean; several answers to applications for employment, one letter from a personal friend, who seemed to have lost track of Van Patten for a long time, congratulating him upon his marriage and a brakeman's pass on the W. N Y & P. Railroad, There is little room for doubt that

Van Patten was crushed under the car wheel, having, perhaps, been thrown from a car on the wrecked train. He was a light-complexioned man, about 5 feet 10 inches in heighh and 180 pounds in weight. Fixing his age from that given in his discharge from the army, he was 31 years old. The news was sent to his wife in Olean and she went to Wellsville on Monday, where she was met by Coroner Burdick The remains were identified by Mrs. Van Patten as those of her husband, and they were taken to Olean. The widow, who has five small children and is in destitute circumstances, says that her husband left her about six weeks ago to look for work. He found none nd wrote her that and was probably on his way thither when he met his death.
