### THE REPUBLICAN MASS MEETING.

#### The Ball Started Rolling.

Last evening was held, at Prest's Opera House in this village, one of the first Republican mass meetings of this section. There was a good crowd present, who listened attentively to what was said by the speaker on the issues of this campaign.

The meeting was called to order by J. Driscoll, President of the Republican Club, who made a brief opening speech, which was well received.

The music was furnished by the Excelsior Cornet Band and the Male Glee Club, which was loudly applauded.

Hon. W. L. Riley, of New York, the speaker of the evening, was introduced by Mr. Driscoll, who held his audience spell-bound for over an hour, in explaining the complex question at issue in the present political campaign. He is a pleasant speaker, and the time passed altogether too soon.

After a few remarks by Revs. W. B. Wagoner and G. M. Janes, the meeting adjourned.

If all the orators who shall address the people on political subjects shall be as fair, as dispassionate, as courteous in the treatment of the principles and the candidates of their respective parties as Messrs. Van Fleet and Riley have been in their speeches here, we shall begin to think that it is indeed a campaign of education, and that the science of politics is not the art of mud-slinging.

Just as we go to press, intelligence reaches us of the death of Wilber Burdick, at Netarts, Tillamook county, Oregon. The details are meager, but we learn that he died on Thursday, Sept. 10th, 1896, and was buried in Tillamook. The cause of death was consumption.

Martindale of Saginaw, Mich.

### Additional Locals.

Allegheny County Maccabees will hold a reunion in Wellsville early in October.

The Alfred University foot ball eleven has organized and is in daily practice.

The annual reunion of the 85th N. Y. S. V. will be held at Olean on Thursday, Oct. 1st.

Trains are running regularly from Angelica again, connecting with Buffalo, Rochester and Hornellsville.

Angelica's water system is almost completed. The water will be turned in the lines in a few days. A hose company has already been formed.

Buffalo gets the National Grand Army Encampment next year, and every G. A. R. man in this state is glad of it. Buffalo will open wide the gates and give them a rousing reception.

Dansville is to have a new system of water works. Eighteen miles of piping will be laid in the village, and a reservoir will be built which will be made to contain 4,000,000 gallons of water.

The Friendship flour mills, together with a sawmill attached and a house and lot in Belfast, which were sold at foreclosure sale on a mortgage of \$5,000, were bought by A. Miner Weitman.

John C. Ward, son of Hon. Hamilton Ward, of Belmont, has entered the Episcopal Theological Seminary in New York. Mr. Ward bore off the honors of the graduating class at Harvard this year, receiving his degree, Magna Cum Laude, and earning a Phi Beta Kappa key.

Hon. W. W. Hicks, of Florida, the Republican orator who spoke so acceptably at the Wellsville Fair, will speak in this village Oct. 1st. He is conceded to be the ablest exponent of sound money principles who has thus far spoken in Western New York during this campaign. Don't fail to hear him.

Arrangements are being made by the Board of Education to hold a reception of the parents and guardians of the pupils and the patrons of our Union School, at the school building, at an early day. That's just right! Let the Board, the Faculty, the sweet girl graduate, the irrepressible small boy and the sovereign people get together.

The hand of misfortune is heavy upon Ulysses, Pa. The late disastrous fire, followed by the still more disastrous failures, has shaken the town from center to circumference. The first of the business reverses destroyed public confidence and executions have followed in rapid succession since. The assignment of Cobb & Chase, dealers in general merchandise, for a large amount of money, was followed by the failure of Homer K. Lane, the druggist, and last week the sheriff shut up A. S. Mintoyne's boot and shoe store.

On Monday morning, James Thornton, of Wellsville, sustained a fracture of the smaller bone, the fibula, of the right leg. The accident occurred at Mr. Thornton's lease on lot 62 Willing, and was the result of the breaking of a buggy wheel, which became twisted under the carriage by running suddenly and unexpectedly into a ditch. The horse did not attempt to run, but in the few feet before he stopped, Mr. Thornton's legs were caught in the spokes and the right one broken as described. He is now resting at his home, having been brought down as soon as possible.

The Faculty of the Union School will issue circular letters to teachers in the rural districts of Andover and vicinity, inviting them to meet the Faculty at the residence of Prof. Estes on Dyke street, on the evening of Oct. 17th.
