HOW TO VOTE FOR FRED A. ROBBINS.

As some misleading statements ... have appeared in print concerning the method of voting a split ticket, the following statement of the law upon the subject is made for the benefit of our readers:

Section 110, Subdivision 2, No. 3, the new Election Law. provides as follows, under the head of "Intent of

"If the elector shall have made a cross X mark in the circle above the name of the party, some of whose ca didates he desired to vote for, and he shall also have placed a cross X mark, before the name of any candidate any other party for any office, the cross X mark in the circle above the name the party ticket must be deemed have cast the elector's vote for every candidate on the ticket of such party so marked except for the candidate candidates for the offices which are individually marked on other tickets, and the candidate or candidates so individually marked on such other ticket o tickets shall be deemed the choice the voter for such office or offices."
