The Meeting of the Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors met at Belmont, in adjourned session, on Tuesday of last week, and adjourned sine die at noon Friday. The one matter of importance taken up was the proposition to change the election of town officers from March to the general election in November. The resolution was presented by Mr. Renwick and was adopted. The following is the resolution:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the time of holding the biennial town meetings in the several towns of the county of Allegany shall be changed so that biennial town meetings be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

That we hereby respectfully request that the Senator and Member of Assembly from this district use all honorable means in securing an enactment by the State Legislature of a special act changing the time of holding town meetings in Allegany county to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in the year 1901 and biennially thereafter.

The act will affect the coming town meeting and defer them to the general election day in the fall when a county ticket will also be voted upon as usual. It will also defer until fall the vote on local option for the sale of liquor. Another important feature will be the continuance of the present Board in office for another year.

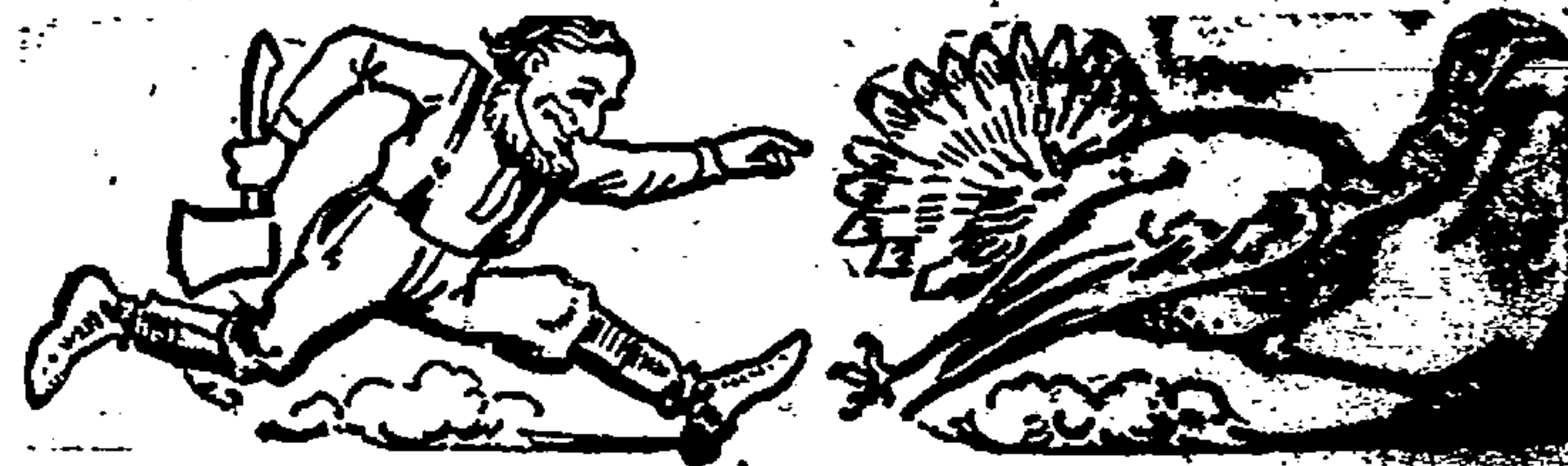
