held at the Blessed Sacrament church.

every evening at 7:30 o'clock. Par-

The Novena will close on
New Year's Day. Father Murray has
told his parishioners that he ardently
desires them all to go to confession
so that they may receive Holy Com-
munion at the Midnight Mass to be
celebrated next Monday night.

By a special decree the Holy Father, Pope
Leo XIII, grants the privileges of
Midnight Mass New Year's eve in all
churches throughout the Catholic world,
in which the Blessed Sacrament is re-
served, and to the faithful the privi-
lege of receiving Holy Communion.

Thus does the Supreme Pontiff ordain
to close the 19th century and by
a most solemn religious service to
usher in the 20th, which he wishes in

a special manner to be dedicated to
Christ the Redeemer.
