The New York Central Railroad company has been making some interestmanufactured. ing tests of the relauve utility and cost of steam and electricity for the propulsion of suburban trains which demonstrate a marked advantage of the latter over the former.

According to statements printed in) the New York papers, two trains, almost equal, were used, one driven by electric motor cars and the other drawn by the very latest type of steam lecomotive, designed specially for suburban service. The engine had 2,465 I square feet of heating surface and two 'twenty inch eylinders of twenty-four inch stroke. The driving wheels were six coupled, 5 feet 8 inches in diameter, and the engine was supposed to represent the latest development in the line of attaining rapid acceleration.

Electricity Versus Steam.

As a result of the experiments it was found that at the end of ten seconds the locomotive with alk cars reached a speed of 9.7 miles per hour, while in the same time the electric train was making 11.2 miles per hour. Running with fewer cars, the engine drawn train showed a speed of 16.3 miles per hour at the end of twenty seconds, while the electric train showed 21.2 miles per hour. In a half minute the speed of the steam train was up to 20.8 miles an hour, while the electric train was mak-
