TAX-COMPLETED.

Large Increase in Assessed Valuation in New York State.

The State Board of Equilization have adopted the Equilization table for the coming state tax year. On this table will be assessed the state tax of thirteen one hundredths of a mill to be levied. This will raise the sum of \$500,000. The legislature expectèd to raise seven hundred fifty thousand. The greater sum will be realized because of an increase in assessed valuation amounting to nearly twenty-seven and a half percent, made chiefly in greater New York and Erie county. The equilization will add to the assessed valuation of many coun The total equalized value of real and personal estate in the several
