Roosevelt's popular majority in 1904 was 2,545,515. It looks big, but it is accounted for by the fact that his chief opponent that year was Alton B. Parker, Democrat, who failed to receive as a whole the vote of the Bryan following. In proof of this, McKinley's popular majority in 1900 was 849,790, and in 1896 it was 601,854. McKinley's opponent in both cases was Bryan. Taft's plurality was 1,269,804, and his opponent was Bryan.

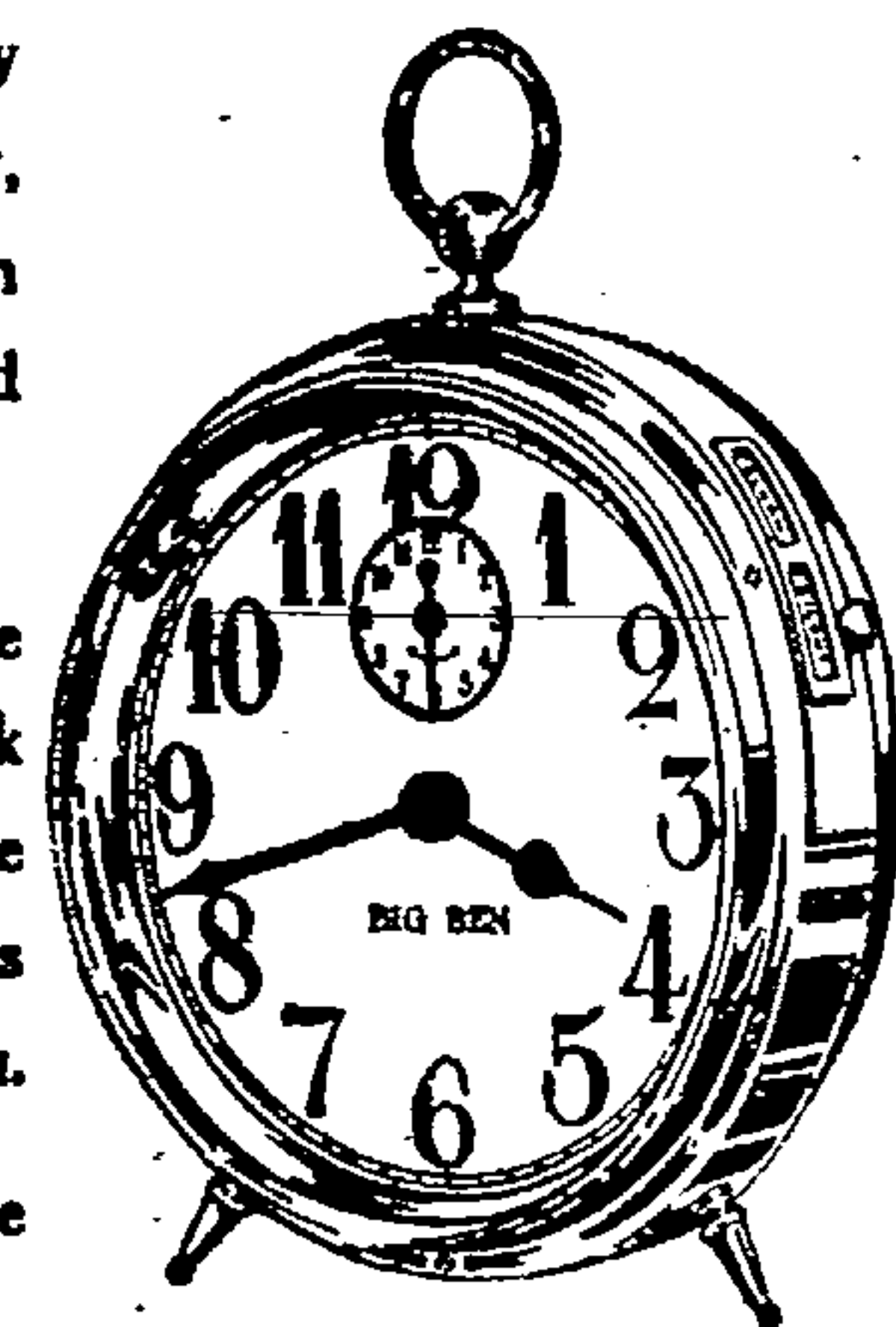

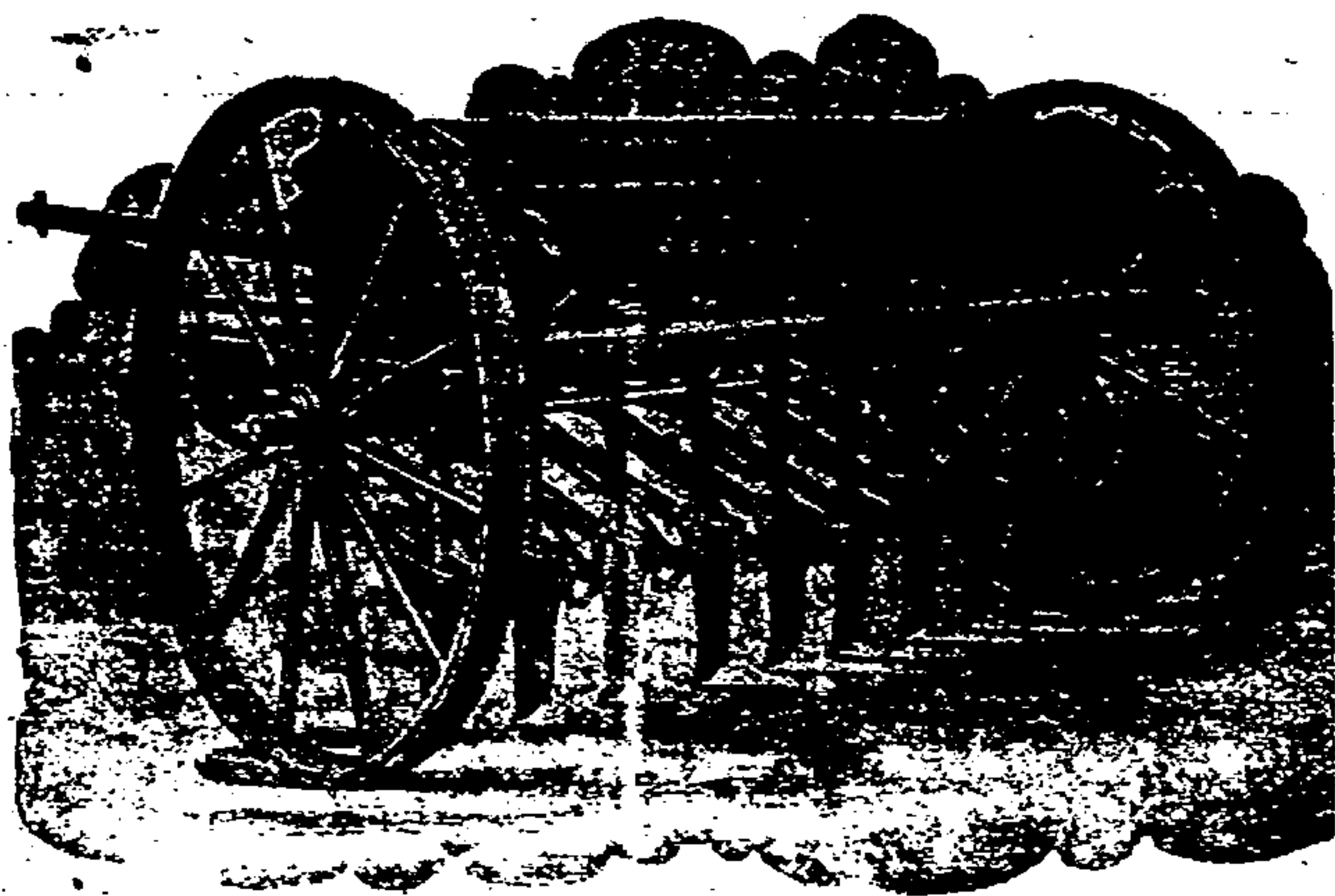
