I inquired what kind of insects came from the ground, he replied that he didn't know, but he was certain that they couldn't cross the tar paper. When I told him that the pests came from butterflies he gently informed me that I was crazy.

"He suggested to cross the street to a neighbor's who had his trees similarly bound; so to please him we inspected the other trees. I cut one of the bandages and found the inner side literally covered with insects. The tar paper made a great shield for them from the weather and protected them from the birds. The proof was enough and my friend immediately returned and cut off all of the bandages that he had worked so hard to put on.

"Such bandages are just what the insects are seeking," said Mr. Camp-

Mr. Campbell said that pests come into the city by way of the arteries leading into the city. In a case of a pestilence of these insects he said that it is ever the case that the railreads or the highways leading into the city are first infected. The insects drop from the trees onto wagons and cars and are thus brought into the city.

A vigorous fight put up against the insects when they first begin to assemble will always exterminate them Ir may cost a few hundred dollars to do this, but the result shows it to be profitable.


