

FAMOUS WORKER FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Wife of Former Andover Dr. P. B. Hardy, Has Traveled and Labored For Suffrage Over the World.

We take the following from Detroit Tribune, concerning wife of a former Andover Dr. P. B. Hardy of Tecumseh, Mich. Mrs. Hardy has been in Andover and has friends here.

With command of five languages, excellent ability as a public speaker and writer of news and magazine articles, she has been a potent factor in the work which she has espoused.

Her work for equal suffrage has covered a large territory including the United States, Zealand, Australia, Austria, Hungary and Germany, while in England she delivered over 20 lectures during the last campaign.

Mrs. Hardy joined the Michigan Equal Suffrage Association many years ago six weeks before she came to Michigan from Australia and during this time she has finally held some office as chairman of legislative committees both times when the amendment was voted on and was present in person during both campaigns.

Mrs. Hardy was born in Melbourne, Australia, Sept. 20, 1864, and received her education in many parts of Australia, Italy, Austria, Switzerland and Melbourne, a member of the Australasian Society for the Advancement of Women, and a member of the Victorian Political Association.

She became so notable that the aborigines of New Zealand with great ceremony, adopted her as one of their tribe. In her travels she has navigated the globe three or four times, has travelled many times to New Zealand, yearly to Europe, has visited via Montenegro, and the Balkan states and the South Islands.

Personally Mrs. Hardy is an unassuming little woman, devoted to her home, but when she comes acquainted with her work, not long before her intense interest in the cause for which she labored so earnestly becomes apparent.

In the past four weeks Mrs. Hardy has been active in soliciting food and clothing for the war sufferers in Europe.
