Shelley had one most singular hobby, which he rode whenever he got the chance. The great poet took great pleasure in making paper boats and floating them on the water. So long as his paper lasted he remained riveted to the spot, fascinated by this peculiar amusement. All waste paper was rapidly consumed, then the covers of letters, next letters of little value. The most precious contributions of the most esteemed correspondents, although eyed wistfully many times and often returned to his pocket, were sure to be sent at last in pursuit of the former squanders.

Of the portable volumes which were the companions of his rambles, and he seldom went out without a book, the fly leaves were commonly wanting. He had applied to his ancestor Noah applied to his wood. But learning was so sacred in his eyes that he never trespassed further upon the integrity of the copy; the work itself was always respected.
