### SUGGESTIONS FOR SPRAYING APPLES AND PEARS

First Spray.—Lime sulphur (Winter strength) in late Winter or early Spring before the buds open. This is to control San Jose scale and blister-mite and as a general renovating spray. Cover every twig and branch and also the trunks of the trees.

If San Jose scale is present use one (1) gallon of standard lime-sulphur to eight (8) gallons of water. If there is no San Jose scale use one (1) gallon to ten (10) of water.

Second Spray.—Lime-sulphur—Summer strength, and arsenate of lead immediately after the petals fall. This is to control the codling moth or apple worm also the apple or pear scab. Use 1 1/4 gallons of standard lime-sulphur to 50 gallons of water and add 2 1/2 pounds arsenate of lead (paste) or 1 1/2 lbs. arsenate of lead (powder). Apply thoroughly using a strong pressure and direct the spray squarely into the blossom clusters.

This is the most important spray for the codling moth or apple worm.

Third Spray.—Repeat number two about 14 days after the petals fall.

Fourth Spray.—Repeat number two about seven (7) weeks after petals fall.

In most orchards if the spraying is thoroughly done the first, second and fourth sprays will be sufficient to give fairly clean fruit.

From two to three gallons of dilute spray will be required for each tree of mature age for the Winter spray. From four to six gallons will be required per tree for the Summer sprays.

Most standard grades of lime-sulphur now sold on the market test about 300 Baume. Each gallon should be diluted with 8 to 10 gallons of water for the Winter spray and with 40 gallons of water for Summer use.

Parties wishing to raise their own lime-sulphur solution should write the Geneva Experiment Station, Geneva, New York, for bulletin giving full instructions. The home made solution is not as strong as the commercial and less water should be used with it.
