WILL LEAD PROGRESSIVE

Victor Murdock Succeeds Dixon as Progressive Chairman

New York, Feb. 28.—Representative Victor Murdock of Kansas has been chosen chairman of the national committee of the Progressive party, the committee announced to-night in a statement which read:

"Some weeks ago former Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana, chairman of the national committee of the Progressive party, resigned for the reason that it has been impossible for him during the last two years to leave Montana, where his business interests are located. The question of a successor has recently been submitted to the members of the Progressive national committee by referendum and Congressman Victor Murdock has been unanimously chosen as his successor. Mr. Murdock has accepted and his election is therefore announced."
