**Two Suppers.** The two suppers last week, one by the Brotherhood and another by the Ladies Aid, netted neat sums for the respective organizations.

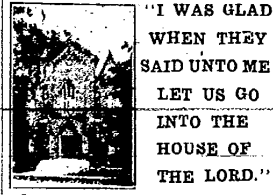

#### PUNCTUALITY

There is no personal quality that commands more respect or covers more ground than punctuality. It touches the character at almost every point and has the whole man behind it.

On hand and ready for work at the appointed moment, bodily and mentally present, bodily and mentally ready: This may seem an easy thing but when we look into it we shall see that it is one of the most difficult things in the world. It never happens by the mere force of gravity. The natural tendency of things is not towards it, but always from it. It is like the centrifugal force in nature, with the centrifugal pulling away from it. We fly off from our work and miss our appointments as naturally as a stone flies from a sling.

He who sticks to his work and is always on hand at the appointed time and place is strong in a good many ways. He is physically strong and healthy or he could not get there and stay there. He is therefore a man of good digestion and pure blood and self-control. He is master of himself and of his thoughts and his thoughts are on a pretty high level. They are where he puts them, not where they happen to wander. He is a man with a purpose and although he may not always succeed he has in him the raw material for it and with any kind of a chance is pretty likely to win and the best thing in his favor is the confidence that is inspired by his punctuality.
