FR-FRIENDSHIP ROAD TO BE LET

Will Be Received at Albany April 14, for the Construction of Part Two of Said Road to Genesee Town Line.

In Dunfee, State Commissioner of Highways, will open Albany, on April 14th for the building of the second part of the Friendship-Bolivar highway, Allegany County. Plans provided for the construction of 2.26 miles of brick pavement guaranteed for a period of 20 years varying in width from 14 to 23 feet and 4.45 miles of macadam with a guarantee for years with widths of 12 to 14 feet.

The road continues from the first part of the Friendship-Bolivar highway and south-westerly to the west end of the Village of Bolivar, continuing south-westerly the existing pavement at street, and also meets the street at Liberty street, westerly to the south corner line of Bolivar to the town line.

The brick pavement will be on a 5 inch concrete base with a 1 1/2 inch sand cushion, and will be 14 feet wide from the center line of the property of Frank Davis in Richburg village to the center line of Frank Davitt in Bolivar village. From that point to the present brick pavement at Plum street in Bolivar village it will be 24 feet wide.

Between Liberty street and Bolivar village, and the property of C. Macdonald, it will be 30 feet wide. From that point to the corporation line of Bolivar village it will be 30 feet wide.

The bituminous macadam construction consisting of 6 inches of macadam and 2 inches of sand, will be 12 feet wide and will be laid from the end of the present Friendship-Bolivar highway to the corporation line of Richburg village and from the Bolivar village to the corporation line to the Genesee town line. The bituminous macadam widens to 15 feet from the eastern corporation line of Bolivar village to the property of Charles Saunders.

At the same time the Commissioner will receive bids for the paving of thirteen other highways in Albany, Essex, Franklin, Oneida, Oswego, St. Lawrence and Wyoming Counties. The total length of 65.43 miles.
