Mrs. Sammis, Suffrage Leader Tells of Her Many Acts on Election Day

Mrs. Ida B. Sammis, Assembly District Suffrage Leader of Huntington, L. I., who takes exception to the argument that women cannot vote and properly attend to home duties has prepared a statement showing just what she did on April 6, when she voted upon the village appropriation question.

She arose at 6 a. m., prepared breakfast for the family, washed the dishes, cleaned on the first floor, hung pictures, arranged draperies, made pea soup, cooked meat, baked potatoes, baked dessert and had luncheon with her family. Then she washed dishes and cleaned up.

Next she went to the polls and voted before her husband did. She went to a lawyer's office and gave testimony in a will case; visited another lawyer and transacted some legal business. At 2:45 went to bank and at 3:00 organized an adult Bible class. The diary of the day continues:

"4:30—son met me with automobile. Stopped to speak to lady returning from card party. Said lady believes a woman's place is at home. 5:45, dinner 8 to 9:30 music, newspapers and books. 9:30 till 8 next morning, sleep from fatigue of voting."
