—The Bank of Warsaw has closed its doors for business. The deposits are reported as about \$130,000.

—Jacob P. Apgar, a veteran of the Civil War, aged 70 years, died April 27th at his home in Richburg. Burial was at Allentown.

—Andover High School Base Ball Team plays Almond to-day. Belmont plays the local High School Team here Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

—Clean Up Day was as usual a busy one in Andover, the teams beginning early and working late. For the money expended this is one of the most commendable acts of the Village Board.

—It costs in round numbers \$350.00 a year for each and every Andover pupil attending Andover High School. Wouldn't it be cheaper to pay their tuition and car fare to some other nearby institution?

—The body of a boy baby was caught on a fish line and brought to the surface of the river in Wellsville Friday by Master Robert Murphy of that place. The body was taken to the police station.

—Twenty-five thousand hogs and cattle and dogs in South Philadelphia have been ordered to be placed under strict quarantine when federal and state officers discovered 4,000 hogs affected with the foot and mouth disease.

—Theodore Freeman of Wellsville has been elected a State delegate to the Supreme Convention of secedees, which will be held in San Francisco, Cal., beginning May 18th. Mr. Freeman will leave Saturday en-route for the Pacific coast.

—Sergeant and Mrs. Elmer Kemp expected to sail yesterday from Honolulu, enroute for San Francisco, Cal. They will arrive in Andover about the first of June for a visit with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Kemp and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Bess and other relatives.

—Corning water system has been condemned as unfit for use. The situation was so serious that the fire bell was tolled at intervals through the day to warn the people and posters were hurriedly printed and distributed throughout the city, telling of the danger.

—Arrangements are being made for the Suffrage County Convention to be held at Belmont, May 20th. The meeting promises to be of great interest. Speakers from the foremost workers for the State campaign will be present. Local suffragists should plan to be in attendance.

—F. R. Chamberlain & Co. of Wellsville sustained several hundred dollars less by the burning of baled hay and straw and other articles in a warehouse on Jefferson street. The building was owned by Wetherby & Keller of that village and was estimated at a loss of four or five hundred dollars.
