—The Greenfield Construction Company have begun the work of grading for the brick road at Bolivar.

—J. L. Williams, who has been confined to the house by illness for the past month, is able to be about the streets again.

—A million baby lake herring from the national government hatchery at Port Vincent, N. Y., have been planted in Cuba Lake.

—James Dunnigan has moved his family from Greenwood to this village into the house owned by Mrs. John Deming on Barney street.

—Prof. W. G. Collier of Geneseo, a graduate of Rochester University has been engaged as principal of Whitesville School the coming year.

—Married in Toledo, Ohio, Miss Margeurite McDonough, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. McDonough of Andover, to Walter L. Gilson of Woodville, Ohio.

—The Fifth World's and Twenty-seventh International Christian Endeavor Convention will be held in Chicago, July 7-12. New York State Endeavorers and their friends are urged to attend.

—Wellsville voted Monday to own and operate a municipal water and electric light plant. The estimated cost to the taxpayers will be \$241,000.00. The proposition was carried by majorities of around 300 votes.

—The Standard Oil Company of Indiana has reduced the price of gasoline to 9½ cents. This makes a cut of 5½ cents during the last year.

—T. J. Gilbert has rented the property owned by the Dimick estate on Church street and will move his family from the Bassett residence thereto.

—Work has started on the Fillmore-Hume State road. When completed it will be over five miles in length and includes the paving of Main street in Fillmore and also Hume.

—Messrs Stanton Davis, Edward Saunders, Erling Ayers and Harold Brainard of Alfred assisted in the musical comedy produced at the Auditorium, Thursday and Saturday evenings.

—About one hundred feet of track on the Cuba-Hunts cut-off near Belfast has settled so on account of quicksand that freight trains were obliged to be run over the Allegany division between Cuba and Hornell.

—Mrs. L. C. Sterner informs the News that she has made application and been accepted as a nurse-in-training at the Albany, N. Y., Hospital. She expects to begin her work the first of June and will have to remain three years. Mr. Sterner anticipates entering College for a two years course at Albany, one year from September next, and they will both finish their education at the same time.

SUFFRAGE GEOGRAPHY

Territorially, the United States is almost half won for equal franchise. Out of its entire three millions, six hundred and some odd thousand square miles, almost eighteen hundred thousand now belong within the suffrage zone. This, of course, includes Alaska Territory.

Our "island" possessions make an additional area, scarcely equal all told, to one big, new Suffrage State. The Philippines, Hawaii, Samoa, Porto Rico, Guam and the Canal Zone are together, smaller, by twenty-one thousand miles than Montana. Montana could take them all in and tuck two New Jerseys and a half in around the edges.

In 1914 Woman Suffrage gained 250,000 square miles. It gained physically as much of continental United States as would make all the campaign States of 1915 put together, and still leave enough land to spare to stretch comfortably over five of the States into which the woman suffrage amendment has recently been introduced.

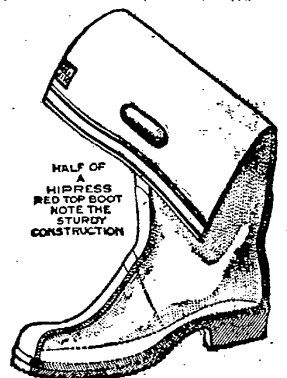
