LIQUOR INTERESTS PRAY TO GOVERNOR FOR VETO OF BILL

Albany, May 17.—No one appeared in favor of the bill intended to increase by twenty-five per cent liquor tax license fees, thereby adding \$4,500,000 to the State's revenues this year at the hearing on the measure today before Governor Whitman, but liquor dealers and real estate interests from many parts of the State opposed it. They declare it unconstitutional and prophesied that if the measure met executive approval its validity would be tested in the courts. They also said it would not prove it to be a revenue raiser, as it would drive so many dealers out of business that the State would be no better off than under present laws.

STUDENTS PROTEST

The students of the Wesleyan University at Mitchell, South Dakota, adopted resolutions protesting against saloons in that city; and state that the attendance of the institution would be greatly increased if there were no saloons. They feel that many parents would object to sending their children to a wet town. It is estimated that fifteen new students would bring to Mitchell as much money as is now received from saloon licenses, and this would be new money, not simply that taken from her citizens and turned over by the saloons. Mitchell is one of the South Dakota cities that carried for prohibition.

NOT COLLECTABLE

The man who sells liquor on Sunday in Illinois can not collect for such sales, as there is a Sunday closing law. Judge Gemmill of the Chicago Municipal Court discharged two men arrested for not paying for drinks purchased on Sunday. "Any man who violates the law himself has no right to accuse another. If these fellows ever forget to pay for drinks on week days you can bring them back," said the judge as he dismissed the prisoners.
