TRACED TO INFECTED MILK

State Health Department Issues
Warning Bulletin Following
Epidemics of Scarlet Fever
and Diphtheria

Albany, June 27. — Eighteen deaths from scarlet fever caused by an infected milk supply in Poughkeepsie and nearby towns together with an epidemic of diphtheria in Suffern also traced to infected milk, form the basis of a special bulletin issued by the State Department of Health warning the people of the State against the use of unpasteurized milk. More than 100 cases of scarlet fever in and near Poughkeepsie developed during May. Two-thirds of the cases had used milk from two farms where there had been mild cases of the disease. Thirty-four of the cases of diphtheria in Suffern had drunk milk from a farm on which there had been a case of that disease.

"There is one sure remedy and only one to prevent such happenings—the pasteurization of all milk supplies," says the Health Department.

"The two original cases of scarlet fever on the dairy farm in Dutchess County and the case of diphtheria on the farm supplying Suffern were all light cases not seen by a physician until the damage had been done. No practical system of inspection could have prevented these outbreaks. The milk supplies that became infected are said to have been all three of them notably clean and of good quality. The process of pasteurization, however, which simply means heating the milk to 145 degrees for thirty minutes destroys all disease germs, does not effect the quality of the milk and would have rendered all of these milk supplies entirely safe. The cost should not exceed 1/4 to 1/2 cent per quart."

The Department calls attention to other epidemics of serious proportions traced to infected milk. One of them occurred on Long Island about a year ago. Two hundred cases of septic sore throat, an exceedingly infectious and dangerous disease, were caused by milk from a dairy where cases of the disease had occurred. Similar though less extensive epidemics of this disease have occurred in at least two places in the State during the past Spring. Only a few years ago nearly 400 cases of typhoid fever, one of the commonest milk

WOMAN'S SPHERE IN 1915

Albany Suffragists Use Brooms

"For the first time in the history of the State" reports the Albany Knickerbocker Press of June 15th "women swept the Capitol steps yesterday. They were all suffragists too and hope to sweep the State next Fall." It was partly the high wind and the rain, playing havoc with their blossoms on "Flower Day" that made the suffrage leaders fall to with brooms. Society suffragists, their selves, tidied up after their flower fete in front of the State House, for they thought it symbolic of their suffrage creed to leave everything "a little better than they found it."

In answer to the prolonged agitation of the anti-suffragists against using the Capitol steps for a suffrage flower sale, which the 'antis' defined as a desecration William H. Storrs, Superintendent of Public Buildings, said: "The Capitol is the property of the people" (and be it noticed here that 'women are people' in this instance) "and I do not see why they should not be allowed to use it in legitimate ways. If any other club, suffrage, anti-suffrage or whatever, asks similar permission and it is possible to grant the request, I will be glad to do so."

Another Prop Gone

One of those 'privileges of women' whose possession, it is said, ought to prohibit her from having even so much as desire for the vote, has been accounted the receiving of alimony. Here comes along a new set of facts which 'privileged class.' These are not new cases, brought about by the new and restless woman; they are cases recorded within the United States divorce courts from the year 1887 to 1906. And they are actual receivers, not merely seekers, of alimony. The latter class would add another two thousand to the number. The aggrieved wife who seeks support from her ex-husband gets it in about 72 percent of the instances. The aggrieved husband gets in about two percent, less often.

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fact, none of the older suffrage States shine in this list at all. Incidentally, it may be news to the antis to learn that the greatest field for divorce is not inside suffrage territory, but in the north central division where nearly half of all the divorces in the United States were granted in the two decades in question. So these extra privileged men, who should be reminded that they are jeopardizing special advantages by using their ballots, are found to be 673 in Ohio, 443 in Michigan, 243 in Nebraska—all States which have recently refused the ballot to "privileged" women.

Magna Charta Celebration

The women of the Empire State Campaign Committee who asked for the privilege of sending a speaker to the 7th anniversary celebration of Magna Charta were permitted a small committee to represent them there, but no speaker. Four leading women suffragists took this opportunity to be present and hear the speeches made by men. They did not sit upon the platform. They occupied seats on the floor. They heard William D. Guthrie, discussing the Great Charter in its relations to American institutions to-day, recall how "two hundred and eighteen years ago the Royal Governor of New York ... explained to the Legislature of the colony; 'There are none of you but are big with the privileges of Magna Charta.'" Mr. Guthrie continued with this question, And to-day, Mr. President, can it not be said with equal force and pride that there are no Americans but are big with the privileges of Magna Charta?"

There are in the United States to-day 20,891,310 women over twenty-one years of age who have no voice in the government of the United States. There are 9,700,978 who have no voice in state, county or municipal government, who can not vote for the Boards that control their children during school hours, nor for the uses to which their own taxes are put.

Long Island Women's Clubs For Suffrage

At the twentieth annual convention of the Long Island Council of Women's Clubs just held in Rockville Center, a resolution was adopted favoring extension of suffrage to the intelligent of both sexes. Attached to the resolution was a paragraph urging every member of the clubs represented in the Council to work for equal franchise.
