### MUST PUT BACK TRAINS

Erie Looses Case in Public Service Commission Brought by Canaseraga

The Public Service Commission has ordered the Erie Railroad to restore its trains No. 478 and 475 to service on the Buffalo division between Castile and Hornell. Train No. 478 is ordered to leave Buffalo at 6:05 and arrive at Hornell about 9:30, making stops in addition to those provided for in its present schedule at Portage, Hants, Dalton, Swains, Garwoods, Canaseraga, Burns and Arkport. Train No. 475 is ordered to leave Hornell at 5:55 a. m., arriving at Buffalo about 9:35, and making the same stops as the eastbound train.

The order is made on the complaint of Frank Brown and other residents of Canaseraga and nearby places, which alleged that when the two trains were taken off between Castile and Hornell the residents of the places between were deprived of local service by which they were able to go to Rochester or Buffalo and return the same day with a useful interval for business in either city, and were not able to make connections with the Pennsylvania at Portage, the B. & P. at Silver Springs, and the Buffalo, Attica & Arcade at Attica. The railroad company's defense was that the trains did not pay, that its loss on passenger business on the Buffalo division was \$56,000 annually and \$1,000,000 annually on the passenger business of the whole system. The order of the commission points to the fact that the road did not contend that its entire business, freight and passenger was unprofitable and holds that it is obligated to provide adequate local service which it determines the trains in question are necessary to provide. The trains must be restored to service on or before July 19.

The Public Service Commission has approved the franchise of the Perry Electric Light Company to sell, net electric plants and lines and furnish electricity in the village of Perry and the towns of Perry and Castile, Wyoming County.

The public plan of the company was duly advertised and a hearing held in the city of Buffalo at which there was no opposition to the approval of the franchise.

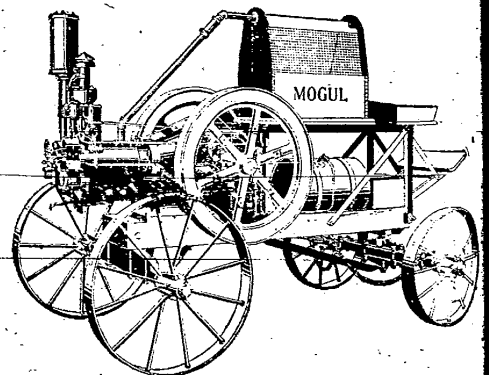
