Swiss Alpine Singers and Yodlers, Big Attraction Here Last Day of Chautauqua



ONE of the most unique and popular musical attractions on the Chautauqua platform, the Swiss Alpine Singers and Yodlers, is coming to furnish the musical entertainment of the last day of our Chautauqua. These singers have drawn immense crowds wherever they have appeared. All are natives of the Swiss mountain country and have voices as clear as the air of their native Alps. They appear in the picturesque national costumes of their people, the most attractive in all Europe.

Their program is varied, the company presenting instrumental music, as well as vocal, using the unique instruments of their native land. They not only sing and play the Tyrolean, Bavarian and German folk songs, but during their stay in this country have added to their repertoire many of the favorite national and popular songs of America.

But it is in their singing of their native songs that they delight their audiences most, for it is in these songs that they introduce their yodling, a manner of singing peculiar to the Alpine region of Europe.

Milli Mayerhofer, the leading soprano, has a clear ringing voice of bell-like quality. Before coming to this country she was the leading spirit of the famous Oberammergau Company, who held their song festivals in Switzerland every summer.

The leading tenor is Jacob Jost. Possessor of a beautiful tenor voice, which has been cultivated from childhood, he carries the same volume and quality into the yodel, so that the latter is not a falsetto simply, but something all its own and must be heard in order to appreciate its wonderful charm.

Noted Community Lecturer to Be Here Chautauqua Week

TWO of the most promising lecturers on our Chautauqua program, according to advanced reports, are those to be delivered on the third day by Douglas Malloch, the noted editor, author, traveler, lecturer and an authority on community development.

Mr. Malloch spent his boyhood and young manhood in a Michigan village, working on a "country daily," and it was this work that brought him into close contact with the "lumberjacks" of the Michigan and Canadian woods and developed his love for out of doors and the simple things of life. He spends many weeks every year working in the lumber camps and has written quite a number of widely quoted poems dealing with life in the open.

Mr. Malloch's interest in the smaller community as an ideal place in which to live and his contributions to the subject of community development have brought him much prominence. His lectures on this phase of American life are delightfully refreshing and encouraging. He tells what can be done in any community to foster public spirit and co-operation and illustrates his lecture with examples. At the same time the earnestness with which he pursues the ideals of useful living does not blind him to the humorous side of life, and his story telling adds considerably to the effectiveness of his remarks.

WEIGHED IN A VACUUM.

When a Pound of Feathers is Heavier Than a Pound of Lead.

The old joke, "Which is heavier, a pound of lead or a pound of feathers?" is not quite such a joke as it seems at first glance. Archimedes taught us the truth that a body immersed in a liquid or gas receives an upward push equal to the weight of the liquid or the gas it displaces.

Suppose we arrange a balance so that one of its arms can be introduced under the bell of an air pump, and place upon each of its arms a weight, say one pound, both weights made of the same size. They will exactly balance each other. If we exhaust the air from under the bell, producing a vacuum, we remove the upward push, and the arm of the balance that is in the vacuum descends. If on the contrary we compress the air under the bell we make the displaced air weigh more and consequently the upward push is increased and this arm of the balance ascends.

It is manifest that the greater amount of air displaced the greater will be the upward push. Suppose now we balance a pound of lead on one arm and a pound of feathers

on the other. They will, of course, exactly equal each other in ordinary air, for they were both weighed in ordinary air. Now let us put the whole apparatus, including both weights, under an air pump. The pound of feathers displaces far more air than the pound of lead, and if we exhaust the air we shall find that the upward push being removed by the exhaustion of the air the pound of feathers descends and the pound of lead ascends, proving that the seeming paradox that a pound of feathers weighs more than a pound of lead is no joke but a scientific fact.

Therefore it may scientifically be said that of two substances having the same weight and not the same volume, that having the larger volume is really the heavier.—New York World.
