Washington, July 12.—According to estimates made by officials of the treasury, the population of the United States proper has now passed over the 100,000,000 mark. These figures are exclusive of the island possessions of Uncle Sam. There was a gain of 142,000 during the month of June, which makes the number of inhabitants living within the United States and Alaska 100,725,000.

For the 12 months ending June 30, the treasury officials estimate the nation's growth in population to have been 1,698,000. Since January 1, 1879, the population has more than doubled, its growth being 52,494,000 in 36 years. The census figures are 1910 were 91,972,266.

While the population has been growing at such a rapid rate the amount of money in circulation has been growing also. The latest Treasury statement shows that on July 1 the per capita circulation was \$55.59 as against \$34.53 on July 1, 1914, and \$16.92 on January 1, 1879.

Chicago, July 12.—Resolutions demanding that all church workers unite to procure a saloonless United States of America, and also peace in Europe, were adopted by the World's Christian Endeavor Convention at its final session here tonight. Representatives of fourteen foreign countries, including delegates from five of the warring powers, expounded Christianity and world peace from the same platform.

"Jerusalem" was sung this evening by a chorus of more than 200 members of the convention. Memorial services for the war dead were held in the evening, and a message by Daniel A. Johnson, being presented at the 1915 convention.

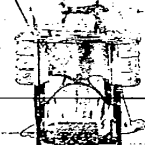
