She spoke of the liquor traffic as the great American robber in the Jericho road of life. 100,000 each year are maltreated by this gigantic robber. In her handling of the topic she likened the church to the priest in the story; the law to the Levites and the W. C. T. U. to the Good Samaritians.

She said that to-day there is an American brewery in Jerusalem and a saloon in Damascus.

Song by the Y. P. B's. and benediction by Rev. Robertson closed the evening.

Thursday morning session opened with reading the 37th Psalm by Miss Ross.

Many earnest prayers were offered by the women.

Resolved, That we bestir ourselves along the line of work for the Young People's Branch and the Loyal Temperance Legion. To this end we will also strenuously demand the continuance of Scientific Temperance Instruction in all our public schools, advocating also such literature for our homes which will encourage temperance and anti-narcotic sentiments in the minds of our young people.

Resolved, That we strongly commend the attitude of our legislature, who have so nobly stood for the cause of temperance and prohibition.

Resolved, That our union be urged to reinforce their work by the liberal use of our publications.

Resolved, That we urge our membership to more general systematic giving.

for comfort and labor saving so that the hours spent there will mean pleasure instead of drudgery. The kitchen stool that can be made high or low is absolutely indispensable. Many times you can sit down to your work and do it just as well. Ironing will be found much easier if the board and stool are the right height and you will soon learn the wisdom of sitting at your work whenever possible. Do not think this a lazy habit. It is simply a saving of energy and at the end of the day you will be brighter and happier because you conserved your strength. The kitchen should be a medium sized room and should have plenty of light, as a rule the wall should be white or light and if the floor is to be covered use the best linoleum for a cheap grade, or oil-cloth is poor economy.

Hotels are on the constant lookout for labor-savers, as an economy; so should housekeepers. Light weight cooking utensils, a good raisin seeder, a lemon squeezer, a wire dish cloth for cleaning pots, a flexible palette-knife, a dish washer, a small water motor that can be applied to the washing machine or the churn; all of these things as fast as they can be afforded or intelligently applied, save time and steps and so human life. If you can't get away from the necessity of keeping things in the cellar, a dumb waiter that lets down through a trap-door in the floor is a simple thing to install and a very great convenience. If housekeepers would make a vow never to take two steps, where one can be made to do, they would be astonished at the result in a short time. Once put your feminine wits to work at it and the most astonishing contrivances will spring into being.

The large livable porch has come to be an essential part of the comfortable home, and in our hunger for the out-of-doors we scarcely can wait until the weather is warm enough so we can move out to the porch. There's no more delightful place than the porch to enjoy the morning meal or the afternoon tea, or to do some fancy work, even the week's mending becomes a pleasure when it's an excuse for sitting on the porch in Summer. Couches and seats play a very important part in the porch furniture and many of them can be constructed at home with the skillful use of a few tools or can be made from old furniture, an old wash stand can be converted into a handy magazine and paper cabinet, by looking over
