Wm. Curtin attempted suicide at Whitesville Monday evening by cutting his throat with a razor. He was discovered as he committed the act and medical attention given immediately. The gash cut was six inches across. For several days Mr. Curtin had been acting in an unusual manner and was being watched by friends.

—Earl H. Walker died at his home in Angelica July 9th, aged 39 years.

—Rev. D. Joseph Mountain has been appointed to the pastorate of St. Patrick's church at Belfast.

—The Ladies Aid of the Baptist church will serve one of their 15c suppers Wednesday afternoon July 28th, from 5-8.

—Thirty-five sheep were killed and several more injured by dogs recently in the flock of Michael Dixon of Almond. The loss is estimated at three hundred dollars.

—Miss Margaret Merrill of Alfred and Prof. R. W. Wingate of Lawrence, Mass. were united in marriage July 15th. They will be at home after September 1st at Alfred.

—Gerald Scott, ten years old, met with a serious accident at the home of his father at Rushford. He fell from a tree upon a picket fence. One of the pickets penetrated the abdomen.

—A heavy rain storm visited Andover Friday night about eleven o'clock. The faulty construction of sluices along the state highway was the cause of much damage and incurred a large bill of needless expense to clear the pavement of debris.

—Wm. McEllwaine of Bath was instantly killed Monday evening while playing ball in the street. An electric light pole was used as mark for a base, and McEllwaine reaching the base, placed his hand against the pole coming in contact with a metal chain used to lower the light. The chain was charged and the young man was electrocuted. Deceased was 28 years of age.

—The widowed mothers pension law went into effect July 1st. The law provides that widowed mothers having one or more children under 16 years of age will be entitled to receive from the state for their support the amount it would cost to maintain the child in a public institution. Investigators must certify that the mother is a proper character to bring up the children.

—Albert Babcock of Scio escaped death by a slight margin, last Saturday. He was working on a large barn in construction at Genesee, when a scaffold gave away at one end and Mr. Babcock was thrown to the ground thirty feet below. As he fell his arm slipped through a loop of rope suspended from the plank which broke the force of the fall. He escaped with a sprained arm and other minor injuries.
