AMONG THE SUFFRAGISTS

A man who suggested repealing woman suffrage in New Zealand would be considered a fit subject for an insane asylum. This statement was made by the Minister of Marines and Customs of New Zealand, S. M. Fisher, during a recent speech in Philadelphia. "I am told in this country," he added, "that woman suffrage will destroy chivalry. In your street cars I see twenty men sitting and one woman standing. In my country they would vie with each other to get the woman to take their seat."

Last Saturday Mrs. Pankhurst led fifty thousand women to the Ministry of Munitions and demanded that women in England should be utilized in the making of munition.

"Without women," responded Lloyd George, "victory will tarry." He gave them the glad hand.

We recall other processions to cabinet ministers in that same country, led by that same woman, and numbering no paltry fifty thousand but hundreds of thousands. These earlier women asked for the vote which they wanted to help avert war. They were given the cold shoulder.

The anti-suffragists were so pleased when they thought they had caught Anna Howard Shaw calling them Home, Heaven and Mother party that they sent it out as a paid advertisement to New York State papers.

They have forgotten that every step in the long journey woman has made from being a slave and a chattel to present status has been opposed by a party carrying a banner inscribed with the magic words, "Heaven, Home, and Mother."

It is easy enough for the anti-suffrage agent to scurry around in the West picking up isolated instances of failure on the part of the woman voter. It is still easier for them to scurry about in the East and tell the people what an awful thing woman suffrage is using their findings to point their moral and adorn their tale. But whenever the statistic reports on the country as a whole the states where women vote lead the way in every department of human progress.

Listen to this latest story on the per capita wealth of the country and then turn a deaf ear on the anti-suffragist who tells you that woman suffrage spells ruin to the financial interests of the country. The recent report of the census bureau estimates the per capita wealth of the United States at \$1965. But in the twelve states where women vote it is \$2715. It is \$5038 in equal suffrage Nevada, and it is the lowest \$726 in Mississippi.

As one scans the list it is found that those commonwealths whose statesmen have protested most vehemently against the invasion of votes for women as a menace to public welfare are exactly those states that have the least to lose.
