U. S. SHIPS ON THE HIGH SEAS

The United States has been trying for a quarter of a century to introduce American ships into our foreign commerce. When former Senator Hanna of Ohio, proposed a ship subsidy, the country responded with a cry of alarm lest Wall street or some one connected with it, might steal a few pints of the salty ocean. Perhaps it was a recollection of these events that caused President Wilson to suggest government-owned ships. Two hundred and eighty-two boards of trade and commercial organizations of the country have been polled, and eighty per cent. of the votes cast are opposed to government-owned ships. In one of the ballots 554 votes favored government ship subsidy, while 189 were against. In another instance 713 votes were cast favorable to establishing freight and mail lines to foreign countries, and there were fifty-two votes against. This proposition contemplates commerce under the American flag. As Senator Hanna's proposition cannot be revived under a Democratic administration, since the party is on record against it; and inasmuch as President Wilson's scheme has been tomahawked by his own party in Congress, the proposition for American shipping appears to be in a bad way. The American people evidently are willing to let private capitalists build and operate ships, but refuse to allow Congress to give such aid and protection as to insure something being done. Meanwhile there is no probability of the United States attaining glory, supremacy or even substantial representation as a maritime power, since there are no "jackies" in American finance; and the Government up-to-date has failed to make any progress.

Carrying the Government to the Country

The Federal Trade Commission has started on a trip that will end at San Francisco; and enroute will hold hearings in the principal cities, for the purpose of determining how it can best serve the business interests of the country. Chairman Davies declares that "business men of to-day do not intentionally disobey the law," and the avowed purpose of the tour is to arrive at a better understanding everywhere as to the best and most feasible methods that should be adopted in carrying on the commerce of the nation. Business and the government have been getting together on a pretty good understanding in recent years, since the trusts were convinced that they were not the whole works; and the trip of the Commission is nothing more than a method for carrying the government straight to the people of the country.

The War Bugs

A New Jersey Congressman became demented on the subject of war; an Iowa enthusiast who spent his own money in a newspaper peace-propaganda operated from Washington, was "suppressed" by being moved to an asylum. There are other cases, etc., ad infinitum—and you may even have noticed the development of new eccentricities among some of your own neighbors. Meanwhile the carnage proceeds; whilst the Washington Administration adds its mite by shooting paper bullets at the Kaiser, and refuses to become excited over the criticisms of the nation's unpreparedness to stage a performance like that now going on in Europe.

What Is a Weed?

One authority of the Agricultural

Department has made the "original discovery" that a weed has been defined as a plant out of place. The definition has not been convincing, and a latter bulletin from the Department says that "in reality a weed is a wild plant that has the habit of intruding where not wanted," perhaps resembling somewhat, some people.

Indians Are Being Civilized

The original American citizen is losing his individuality, as according to the census only three-tenths of one per cent of the entire population of the country is composed of Indians. An old rhyme runs: "When Columbus discovered America, and met the savage tribes; they were dressed in paint and feathers, and little else besides." But now there is a tendency for the habits of the Indians if not the races themselves, to disappear altogether, and in ten years there has been an increase in population of only seven per cent. The Director of the Census says there is a decreasing vitality of full blooded Indians, an increasing admixture of white blood, decreasing illiteracy, and a big falling off of the "reservation Indian," and self-supporting Indians. There are 75,000 Indians in Oklahoma, or twenty-eight per cent. of the whole population. The count shows that in 1910 the number of Indians still living, excluding Alaska and Insular possessions numbered 265,683.

Another Republican Organization

Charlie Hart is a Washington newspaper correspondent who blew into the Capital from Spokane a few years ago, and besides writing for western papers, busied himself by becoming Secretary of the National Press Club and getting acquainted with everybody who spends more than forty-eight hours a year in Washington. When Ex-Senator Bourne launched his independent Republican Publicity institution in the Capital Mr. Hart took the view that the movement was in the interest of "big business" and the "old guard." He proposes to offset the effects of the official and unofficial Republican organizations which he believes spell only "standpatism," and he has organized a Progressive Republican bureau. This makes four Republican organizations in Washington. The newspaper correspondents take kindly to anything Mr. Hart does, and therefore he will likely be able to cut quite a swath. However the indications are that Republican organizations are considerably overorganized; but the promoters of the varied branches successfully "kid" themselves into the belief that they are doing a wonderful work in "saving the country."

Fickle Fame

Leslie M. Shaw of Iowa, was once a famous Secretary of the Treasury, but when he visited Washington a few days ago, he was so forcibly impressed by the way he was not observed, that he related an experience of former Senator Ingalls as illustrating his own fall from favoritism at the hands of fickle Miss Fame. Mr. Shaw said a man slapped Ingalls on the back, and he turned to recognize a former colleague in the Senate. "I'm surely glad to see you," said the Kansan, "for I've been in Washington two days and not another soul has spoken to me." Shaw went over to the Treasury, introduced himself to one of the assistants, and the latter showed him his own portrait; and standing before it the former Cabinet officer was reminded that Uncle Sam had actually given

him a little place in a permanent niche.

Surveying the Public Domain

There are 150 surveying parties establishing lines for Uncle Sam in different parts of the United States. Secretary Lane has taken great pride in opening new portions of the country to settlement, and all records were broken last year in the making of surveys of public lands. The total of accepted and approved acres which was nearly double the surveys aggregated 14,339,349 acres, which was nearly double the amount surveyed during the preceding year. The approval of the surveys opens the lands to settlement and there has been a great demand for this land, particularly in the Rocky Mountain and Pacific Coast regions.

GREAT HORNELL FAIR.

Next Monday entries will open in all departments of the Great Hornell Fair, and the advance sale of season tickets will commence. Premium lists offering upwards of \$7,000 in premiums for the best exhibits of live stock, poultry, farm products, home industries, and school work are being distributed to all interested. Special efforts are being concentrated upon the exhibit of 150 head of Holstein-Friesian cattle under the auspices of the Allegany-Steuben Friesian Breeders' Club and upon the School Work Exhibit. A herd of 75 Holstein cattle will be shown from Allegany County under E. E. Clark of Andover as Herd Captain, and another herd of 75 head will be shown from Steuben County under R. W. Dennis of Jasper as Herd Captain. Over 500 school children will exhibit agricultural products grown and articles made by them as a part of their school work, and four district schools will compete for liberal premiums offered for school displays. There will be no other Fair in Western New York on the same dates as Hornell which means that there will be a large number of horses entered in the races. A vocal orchestra will again entertain in the Grand Stand, and the other special attractions will be the best obtainable.
