NEW THEORY OF GRAVITATION

Naval Observatory Head Declares The Force Is Transmitted the Same As Sunlight

Prof. Thomas Jefferson Jackson See, who is in charge of the Naval Observatory at Mare Island, Cal., has announced to the Royal Society of London a new theory of the cause of gravitation. The society to which Prof. See submitted his theory was the same one to which Sir Isaac Newton made his first report after discovering the law of gravitation.

Prof. See announced in St. Louis yesterday that next September, on the 250th anniversary of Newton's discoveries, he would make public many more details concerning his theory as to the cause of gravitation and other phenomena he has had under observation.

Prof. See contends that gravitation is an electrical phenomenon which is caused by elementary electric currents circulating about atoms of matter. This theory is an extension and elaboration of physical laws first demonstrated

by the French physicist, Ampere, sixty-five years ago. Ampere showed that two parallel currents of electricity, flowing in the same direction, attract each other, but repel when flowing in opposite directions. Much of the complicated electrical machinery of the present day is made possible by the adoption of this principle. Prof. See goes beyond this hypothesis and asserts the entire universe is governed by forces dependent upon electricity in motion. "Gravitation," the professor says "is not an instantly acting force, but is transmitted through space at the same rate as sunlight. Thus it would come from the sun to the earth in eight minutes."
