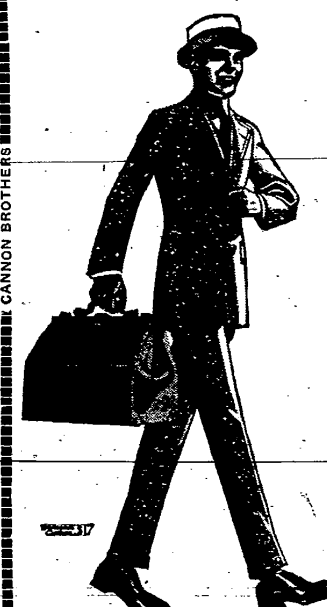

BLIGHT HAS APPEARED

State School of Agriculture Sends Out the Following Preventative to the

right of potatoes is appearing in many fields of Steuben and Allegany Counties. This is a serious menace to potatoes and should be prevented. The blight is identified by the presence of most dark spots on the edges of the leaves. These spots are most prominent on the lower side of the leaves. The blight is due to the presence of spores.

It is an insurance policy to purchase Bordeaux already prepared, but it is cheaper and more satisfactory to make it. Place 50 lbs. of blue vitriol (copper sulfate) in a burlap sack and add the top of 50 gallons of water. Shake 50 pounds of soda ash and add it 50 gallons of water. These two preparations make Bordeaux solutions. Add 1 gallon of the vitriol solution to the spray tank and add 1 gallon of the soda ash solution. The result is Bordeaux, enough to cover the

light lives over in the soil. It is planted in the soil and grows up through the soil and forms spores which lower leaves. These spores on the leaves, send out spores which blow about the field. The blight is effective, spraying Bordeaux once, in order to prevent the blight spores from reaching the leaves. Bordeaux is a preventative cure for blight. It should be repeated every ten days. Care should be taken to cover the leaves with the
