—Services as usual at Seventh-day church during month of August.  
—Over 100,000 horses have been shipped from this country to meet the war demand.  
—Miss Mildred Briggs of Hallsport and Leon G. Lewis of Wellsville were married July 31st.  
—The 3rd reunion of the Hartum and Stryker families was held at the Park last Thursday.  
—Mrs. Julia Layton died at the family home at Allentown, July 30th. Interment was at Bolivar.  
—Twenty-two tickets were sold Wednesday morning at Andover for the Firemens Convention at Salamanca.  
Don't do too much knocking about all this war news in the daily press. We are experiencing a welcome respite from politics.  
—The blacksmith and wagon shop of L. G. Arnold at Wellsville burned Saturday morning. The loss is placed at \$5,000 with \$1,000 insurance.  
—John Compton died at his home in Nile July 28th. Mr. Compton had been failing since December when an operation at the Buffalo hospital failed to restore him to health.  
—Mrs. Jessie H. Ward, widow of the late Edmund Ward died at her home in Wellsville July 31st, following a stroke of paralysis the evening before. Mrs. Ward was 58 years of age.  
—The 1916 Seniors of Andover High School will celebrate Saturday, Aug. 7th as tag day, and will sell tags to assist them in providing funds for their Washington trip at Easter time.  
—The fire alarm was sounded and the citizens joined in a search for two small children at Bolivar Friday night, one of whom was Raymond, son of Fred McKidden, contractor for the Greenfield Construction Company. At 9:30 when grave fears were entertained that they had fallen into the creek and been carried down by the swift current, the little ones were found fast asleep under the veranda at the McKibben home.

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**CHAMPION DAIRY COWS**  
Among our readers are a goodly number, no doubt, who remember Yeksa Sunbeam, the famous Guernsey cow that made the first official record of butter fat which was equivalent to 1,000 pounds of butter. Her year's record yield was 14920.8 pounds of milk and 857.15 pounds of butter fat with 5.74 for the average per cent of fat.  
This was ten years ago. Later the Holstein cow, Colantha 4th's Johanna 48577, succeeded to the world's championship with a record finished in 1907 of 27,432 pounds of milk and 998.26 pounds of butter fat with a 3.64 per cent test. This cow held the record until November 22, 1911, when she was succeeded by two more Holsteins, Pontiac Clothilde De Kol 2nd 69991, who produced in 1911, 25,318 pounds of milk and 1017.28 pounds of butter fat with 4.02 for the average per cent. of fat; and Banastine Belle De Kol 90441, who in 1912 produced 27,404.4 pounds of milk and 1058.34 pounds of butter fat with an average of 3.86 per cent. of fat.  
This record held sway until 1914 when May Rilma 22761, another Guernsey, produced 19673 pounds of milk and 1073.41 pounds of butter fat with 5.46 for the average per cent. of fat; and later was surpassed by Murne Cowan 19597, who produced 24,008 pounds of milk and 1098.18 pounds of butter fat with an average test of 4.57 per cent. Then Funderne Holingen Fayne 144551, a Holstein, came forth with 24612.80 pounds of milk and 1116.05 pounds of butter fat with an average of 4.53 per cent.  
It is interesting in the above to note that until the last record was made the Guernsey and Holstein breeds tied in the number of cows which had gained grand championship honors.  
It is also interesting to see the records of these cows side by side for comparative purposes as follows:

From this it will be seen that in each case where the world's record has been broken there has of course been an increase of fat produced and along with this in the case of the Guernsey cows there has also been an increase in milk production. These figures are compiled by the American Guernsey Cattle Club and are authentic.—Rural Life.

**SHEPARD DOG IS TOO MUCH FOR BULL**  
Faithful Canine Saves Master From Being Gored to Death  
Hubert Whitney Sustains Painful Injuries—Attacked By Bull  
Hornell, Aug. 1.—But for the time assistance of a shepherd dog in attracting the attention of an ugly bull away from its object, there is little doubt but that Hubert Whitney, of Baker Valley would have been gored to death on his father's farm, yesterday morning, and as it is he sustained injuries which will lay him up for some time.  
As has been his usual custom, Mr. Whitney arose early and went after the cows, taking the dog with him. He had no sooner got into the pasture than the bull, a large two-year-old, rushed at him, knocking him down, trampling him and making every effort to gore him with his horns.  
Mr. Whitney, nearly insensible from the rough treatment he was receiving, had presence of mind enough to keep urging the dog to attack the now thoroughly maddened animal and thus divert his attention.  
The dog finally succeeded in making it so uncomfortable for the bull that he relinquished his attack on Mr. Whitney long enough for him to drag himself to a fence and to safety while the bull spent his wrath in chasing the dog.  
Mr. Whitney emerged from the affray with several cracked ribs, a severely lacerated face, caused by being hooked in the mouth in some unaccountable manner, and a terribly bruised body.  
Dr. Lewis, who is attending the young man, states that he hopes for his recovery, but it will be many days before he will be entirely recovered from his encounter with the ugly bull.
