## CONFERENCES TO NAME PLACES WHERE FARMERS INSTITUTES WILL BE HELD IN ALLEGANY COUNTY

On Saturday, Aug. 14, 2:30 P. M., at the Farm Bureau Office, Old Bank Building, Belmont, State Director of Farmers' Institutes, Edward VanAlstyne will meet in conference representatives from all sections of Allegany County, the purpose being to select places where farmers' institutes will be held next season. A limited number of days of institute work are allotted to each county and community desiring institutes should present their applications at this conference. Localities where institutes are held are required to furnish a suitable hall and to co-operate in advertising and caring for local arrangements. All expense of speakers and printed advertising is borne by the State.

The matter of locating at least one extension school to be held under the auspices of Cornell University will also be considered at this conference. The Farm Bureau Manager will be present and act as the local representative of the Department of Agriculture.

## GREAT HORONELL FAIR

The outbreak of the foot-and-mouth disease and the method of eradication in New York State will be shown in moving pictures at the Great Hornell Fair. This is the chance of a life time to see the dreaded foot and mouth disease in reality. It can be seen by no one other than those afflicted, or the officials engaged in stamping it out except in this manner. This film was taken under the personal supervision of Dr. John T. Claris, expert from the N. Y. State Dept. of Agriculture, and Dr. B. P. Wends, expert from the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture and will be shown for the first time at the Great Hornell Fair under the direction of these departments. In addition the N. Y. State Dept. of Health under the supervision of Dr. John A. Conway will show several thousand feet of films including such famous pictures as "Messenger of Health," "In His Father's Footsteps" and "Bringing it Home." This moving picture exhibition will be free and in place of the usual exhibition of cattle, sheep and swine omitted on account of quarantine. It will be seen that the management of the Great Hornell Fair has taken advantage of adverse circumstances, and will produce a Fair of greater interest to the people this year than ever before. The regularly advertised program of special attractions and racing, and the usual exhibit in all departments, including Horses, Poultry, School Work and Domesticities will be shown, and nothing will be omitted except the exhibit of cattle, sheep and swine.

## FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE IN STEUBEN COUNTY

Washington, D. C., Aug. 9.—The appearance of foot-and-mouth disease in Steuben County has resulted in that county's being quarantined by the Federal authorities. The order becomes effective August 2, and prohibits the interstate movement from the county of all cattle, sheep, goats and swine. No stock can be brought into the county except for immediate slaughter. The appearance of the plague at a time when the area hitherto affected is rapidly being cleaned up make it extremely important, say the officials, that all suspicious sickness in cattle be reported at once. The Counties of Onondaga, Oswego and Rensselaer and the stock yards at West Albany are released from quarantine by the same order. The States of Kentucky and Wisconsin are now entirely free, and the quarantined area in Illinois, New Jersey and Pennsylvania are still further reduced. The States of Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan and Virginia remain unchanged.
