sylvania aid two classes; Iowa, Missouri, Michigan and South Dakota, three classes; Minnesota, Oregon, Colorado and Ohio, four classes. The law in the state of Washington alone embraces five classes. No state makes provisions for all six.

Provisions in New York

In New York State a mother is given the amount that it would cost to maintain the child or children in an institution. She must prove, however, that the child or children would be placed in an institution or institutions if aid was withheld. The amount to be awarded each mother in Monroe county will be \$2.50 a week for each child. This is what it costs the large orphan asylums in Rochester to support a child.

Up to to-day thirty-seven formal applications for assistance have been filed by widows with County Superintendent of Poor Bridges, who is chairman of the Welfare Board. Support for 137 children is asked. Countless inquiries have been made.

F. Harper Sibley, a member of the Board, is preparing a form for the investigators to follow in ascertaining the worthiness of an applicant. All applications will be rigidly investigated. The \$5,000 which the Board of Supervisors voted to the Board, as a temporary fund will be available on September 2nd. At that time aid will be disbursed to those eligible.

HORNELL FAIR NEXT WEEK

Although entries in the cattle, sheep and swine departments have been refused, entries in all other departments of the Great Hornell Fair are surpassing expectations, and a larger exhibit than usual is assured. There will be more special exhibits by State and National Departments than ever before including the Parcel Post Exhibit by the U. S. Postal Department, the Farmers' Education Exhibit by the State School of Agriculture at Alfred, the Child's Welfare Exhibit by the State Health Department, and the Free Moving Pictures of the dreaded Foot and Mouth Disease shown by the State Department of Agriculture. All of the races have been filled, and in many of them exceptionally large fields will start, assuring fast and exciting sport every day. The program of special attractions includes the Dayton Family, a troupe of twelve gymnasts performing two remarkable acts of superior excellence including the famous Risley Act, and two other troupes of accomplished acrobats, besides Kirk's Vocal Orchestra which will give free concerts in the Grand Stand every afternoon. Wednesday will be a special day, and for the first time in Hornell there will be a display of Japanese Daylight Fire Works. The Midway will be arranged and filled as usual with all kinds of shows, freaks, games, riding devices and good things to eat and drink. The remainder of the grounds will be re-arranged this year, and good stabling will be furnished the country patrons in the cattle sheds, while an extraordinary show of poultry will fill the sheep and swine barns. Owing to the additional features and attractions provided under unusual circumstances THE BIG ONE will be more liberally patronized this year than usual and a most successful Fair is predicted.

DOES THE VOTE PROTECT THE WOMAN?

A Comparison. One hundred per cent (all) of the eleven full woman suffrage states have passed widowed mothers' pension laws. Only 46 per cent of the thirty-seven male suffrage states have passed such laws.

Forty-five per cent (5) of the woman suffrage states have passed an eight hour law for working women—Arizona, California, Colorado, Washington and Wyoming.

NOT ONE MALE SUFFRAGE state has done this. Fifty-four per cent (6) of the woman suffrage states have a minimum wage law—California, Colorado, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Kansas.

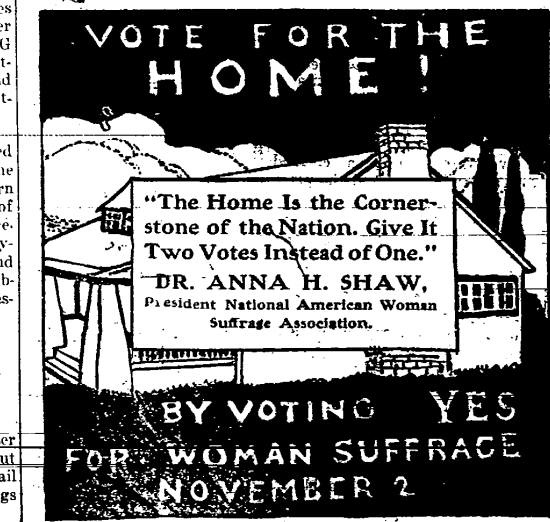
Only 10 PER CENT OF THE MALE SUFFRAGE states have one. Sixty-three per cent of the woman suffrage states now have laws which give the mother equal guardianship with the father over the child she has borne—California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Oregon, Utah, Washington.

Only 35 per cent of the male suffrage states have equal guardianship laws. No equal-suffrage state sets the age of consent for girls under sixteen and 82 per cent of them put it at eighteen. Twenty-four per cent of the male suffrage states permit the age of consent to remain under sixteen.

German Women's Activities Today. When one remembers how German women have been brought up to limit their interests perforce to their own households and how the German woman's "mann" has in the past filled her orbit one realizes how marvelously the German woman has adapted herself to the necessities of war. Here are a few of today's activities of the German women of today: Drainage, tram conducting, the manufacture of shells, the packing of cartridges, making of tents, harness and haversacks, surgical instruments, tinned meats, clothing and tobacco.
