### HORNELL POPULATION.

Albany Sept. 15.—Including the inmates of the institutions which number 56, Hornell now has a total population of 14,384 persons of which 452 are aliens. The official figures for Hornell, compiled from the census enumeration of last June, were made public today by Francis M. Hugo, Secretary of State. In the last five years Hornell had added 776 residents as compared to a gain of 358 made between 1905 and 1910 and a gain of 1,341 that was shown between 1900 to 1905. Fifteen years ago Hornell had a population of 11,918. The city has gained no less than 2,466 residents since 1900. Hornell's population has increased 1,125 in the past ten years.
