THE MORALS OF MARCUS
 Charles Frohman presents Marie Doro in "The Morals of Marcus," at the Auditorium Saturday night.

She is a peculiar little creature known as Carlotta. The theme of the play is both absorbing in interest and refreshing in its originality, and the development of the plot unfolds one of the most delightful love stories that the stage has provided in many years.

MORE DOUBLE TRACK FOR ERIE
 An important improvement is being contemplated, it is reported for the Allegany division of the Erie railroad, in the form of a new stretch of second track to extend from Carrollton junction to W. J. tower, near Allegany, a total distance of five and one-half miles. Figures on the cost of the work are now available. But it is estimated that the labor alone on the job will cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000. It is said that the work will probably be started this Fall and will be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.
 Division Sup. June and Division Engineer A. B. Caldwell are said to have been tentatively planning on the improvement for some time and the New York offices announced it is stated that the work would be started in the very near future. With its completion there will be double track on the entire line of the Erie from Salamanca to Cuba where is the junction of the main line with the River railroad, commonly known as the Cuba-Hunts cut-off.
 A large force of laborers will be engaged on the job, it is likely and it is probable that two steam shovels will be employed in the work, some of which is difficult and involves several earth and rock cuts.

ANDOVER'S POPULATION
 Both the Town and Village of Andover Show Increase in Population
 T. R. Bassett, one of the enumerators, for the town of Andover, gives out the following from the Secretary of State's office:
 State of New York, Secretary of State's Office, Albany, Sept. 23, 1915.
 T. R. Bassett, Andover, N. Y.
 Dear Sir:
 In reply to your letter of Aug. 14th, attached, I would say that the recent census shows the population of the town of Andover to be 2013, of which 1964 are citizens and 14 are aliens. The 1915 enumeration shows the population of the village of Andover to be 1154 of which 1147 citizens and the remaining 7 are classed as aliens.
 Comparative figures show the population of the village to have been 954 in 1900; 977 in 1902; 1097 in 1905; and 1136 in 1910. In 1900 the town of Andover had 1869 inhabitants; in 1905 it had 1979 and the census of 1910 gives the town of Andover a population of 1990.
