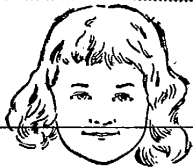

As THE VOTE PROTECT THE WOMAN

A Comparison

of hundred per cent (all) of eleven full woman suffrage states have passed widowed mother pension laws.

Only 46 per cent of the thirty even male suffrage states have passed such laws.

Forty-five per cent (5) of the man suffrage states have had an eight hour law for working women—Arizona, California, Colorado, Washington and Oregon.

Only ONE MALE SUFFRAGE state has done this.

Only four per cent (6) of the man suffrage states have passed a wage law—California, Washington, Oregon, Kansas, and Idaho.

Only 35 per cent of the man suffrage states have equal franchise laws.

Only one equal suffrage state has a franchise law for girls under sixteen and 82 per cent of the states is at eighteen.

Twenty-four per cent of the man suffrage states permit a woman to remain unmarried.
