### PROPOSED CONSTITUTION

#### Committee For the Adoption of the Constitution Formed Under Call Signed by Eminent Citizens.

Albany, Sept. 28, 1915.—A citizens committee will wage a vigorous fight for the adoption of the proposed constitution, which is to be voted on at the general election this fall. It will be composed entirely of citizens who are not members of the constitutional convention and will represent all political parties.

The call for the organization of this committee reads as follows: "The undersigned citizens of the state of New York wish to urge upon their fellow citizens the wisdom of approving the revised constitution submitted by the constitutional convention. We are confident that full knowledge and understanding of its provisions and the reasons for them will lead to approval. The revised constitution now before us offers the opportunity to this state to lead in the same and orderly development of state government without such experiment and to escape the confusion, waste and responsibility which we all know to exist by the adoption of a new constitution."

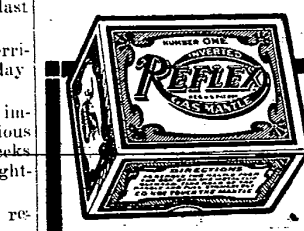
