## COCK IDENTALLY SHOT

### Party Had Sad Accident

One Was Mistaken for a Squirrel and Received Shot in His Body.

That George Cook's and shoulders, as they in the twilight, was setting on a stump, John shot and seriously injured Mr. Cook, at just about midnight evening.

Dr. Deamer came to the top of the hill, not knowing Mr. Cook had changed his mind and was hunting in the woods. Just as he climbed over a stump, Dr. Deamer saw what he thought was a squirrel sitting on a stump and fired.

Dr. Deamer next instant Mr. Cook was shot. "John, you shot me," he believed that Mr. Cook had a chance to recover, but in very critical condition, over the shot in his back from the head to the knees.

C. W. O'Donnell of this village, and Comstock of Wellsville were summoned and are doing all in their power to save the sad accident should be a warning to sportsmen that will come of them to their friends. The wood has been lined with men with guns since the first of the month, and the great fear is that others have not had a like fate as did Mr. Deamer.

## PRES. WILSON FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

### President Wilson Gives Out the Announcement that He Will Support Woman Suffrage Amendment in New Jersey

Washington, Oct. 6.—President Wilson will vote for the woman suffrage constitutional amendment in New Jersey, his home state, at the special election October 19. He said today he would vote, not as the leader of the Democratic party, but as a private citizen.

Mr. Wilson said he believed the question should not be made a party issue and should be decided by the states, not the national government. The following statement was given out at the White House:

"I intend to vote for woman suffrage in New Jersey because I believe that the time has come to extend that privilege and responsibility to the women of the state; but I shall vote, not as the leader of my party in the nation, but only upon my private conviction as a citizen of New Jersey called upon by the legislature of the state to express his conviction at the polls. I think that New Jersey will be greatly benefited by the change.

"My position in regard to the ways in which this great question should be handled is well known. In view that it should be settled by the states and not by the national government and that in no circumstances should it ever be made a party question."

Ithaca, Oct. 4.—After one of the most enthusiastic and successful meetings in the history of the organization the forty-second annual convention of the New York State Women's Christian Temperance Union held here this week, closed at noon today. Upward of 700 delegates have been in attendance.

## FACTS ABOUT REGISTERING

### County Voters May Register By Mail Saturday But Not Thereafter. — Other Registration Days in City and County.

Registration by mail in the election districts outside the city must be made on the first date of county registration, next Saturday, October 9. Personal registration is not required in the country. There are two days of registration instead of four, as in the city. These days are Saturday, October 9, and Saturday, October 16.

On the first Saturday all of the names of voters eligible the year before are carried over on the new books and on that date new voters in the district who will be unable to appear personally may register by mail, addressing the election board or some member of the board. Other voters of the district also may have a new voter's name placed on the rolls.

After the first day the mail registration is closed, however, and it is necessary on the final day for a voter not already registered to appear at the polling place in person.

Voters should not confuse the country system with that in the city and the days are next Friday and Saturday and the following Friday and Saturday. Party enrollment takes place in the city on registration days and in the country on election days.
