FARM BUREAU WORK

Conducted by F. C. Smith
County Agent

Last week the officers of the Allegany County Farm Bureau issued a statement in which they pointed out the lack of organized support accorded the Bureau by the farmers of the county and stating that through a campaign this Fall, they hoped to remedy this condition.

The primary object of this campaign will begin with a meeting of the officers and local committee of the Bureau on Monday, October 25th, at Belmont and continue throughout the week, with meetings in various parts of the county, however, is not to secure members to the Farm Bureau Association, much as they are needed. The Central Office of Farm Bureau has requested that the local Farm Bureau Association this Fall draw up a Permanent Agricultural Improvement Program, for the county, one in which educational institutions, both within and without the county may work together over a period of years. This office has, also, further requested that projects or plans of work for 1916 to put this program into effect be determined upon early in November and presented through Manager Smith to the Extension Department of the College of Agriculture, in order that they may arrange their co-operation in carrying them out.

The Farm Bureau Association members feel that representing, as they do but 2% of the farmers of the county, they cannot assume this responsibility. Accordingly, the executive committee has voted to submit the matter of the program to the farmers of the county as a whole, giving them opportunity to assist in shaping it and in carrying it out through Farm Bureau membership.

Arrangements have been made to hold meetings in every part of the county and Floyd S. Barlow, Manager of the Otsego County Farm Bureau, the strongest organized of its kind in the whole State, has been secured to assist Manager Smith. The committee hopes that the farmers of the county realizing the importance of these meetings will turn out in large numbers. Next week the details of a typical county agricultural program will be explained and further plans for drawing one in Allegany County announced.

"IN MEMORIAM"

William Eugene Smith was born in Wellsville, N. Y., on November 1, 1844, the son of William and Ruth Chase Smith; and died October 5, 1915, at the family residence, No. 16 West Fassett St., Wellsville, N. Y.

On January 30, 1870 he was married to Miss Josephine Grames. To them were born four daughters, Mrs. Bertha S. Wood, of Pittsburg, Pa.; Miss Leah Smith, Miss Florence R. Smith and Mrs. Bonnie Smith Coons, of Wellsville, N. Y., who survive him; also his aged mother of eighty-nine years; and three brothers, W. A. of Hornell; Frederick O., and Frank H., of Sanford, Fla.; and two sisters, Mrs. Charles Bardwin of Elmira, N. Y., and Mrs. Aaron Elliott, of Olean, N. Y.

Mr. Smith was a soldier of the Civil War, enlisting August 4, 1862, at Wellsville, N. Y., in Company "E," First New York Dragoons; and was mustered out of the service, at the end of the war, on June 30, 1865, at Clouds Mills, Va., after having rendered about three years of creditable service.

At the close of the war, he returned to his native town, and entered actively into business life. For two terms, he served as Deputy County Clerk, under Capt. George H. Blackman; and in the year of 1882, he was elected County Clerk, which office he

held for two full terms, with credit to himself, and satisfaction to the County.

For a number of years, he was prominent in the councils of the Republican party of the County. He was a prudent, enterprising business man, and as such he accumulated a handsome competency, sufficient to meet the needs of his declining years, and to leave his family in very comfortable circumstances.

Mr. Smith was a strong positive character, with decided convictions, and a close student of current events.

He will be missed from the business section of the streets, where he was almost a daily visitor.

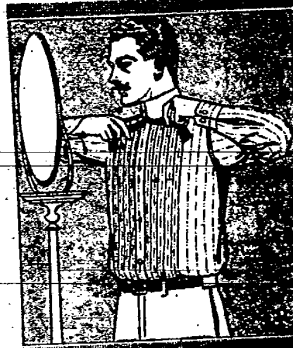
