BIG CROPS IN N. DAKOTA

Mrs. Roy Parker, of Leeds, N. Dakota, in writing to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Stephens, tells of the big crops of grain being harvested there this year.

So much grain is being threshed that there is not enough storage room to hold it—and it is having to be put into pits made of wire and straw.
From a copy of their local paper sent Mr. Stephens, we clip the following:
"Talk about your good daily runs with a threshing rig, Ole Underberg's machine threshed out 2910 bushels of wheat from

eighty-eight acres of land, longed to George Long, who lives between here and Canada. Thirty-six bushes to the acre is some yield.

That the farmers in Canada are having big yields in all crops this year is evidenced by a letter, received by relatives, from Henry Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Anderson, at Barons, Alberta. Mr. Anderson writes that he has just finished threshing and that from 103 acres of wheat he threshed 3797 bushels, from 33 acres of oats the yield was 3619 bushels and from 50 acres of barley, 2782 bushels."
