SUFFRAGE MEETINGS

Plans are being made for three Suffrage Mass Meetings to be held in our county during the coming week. One at Angelica, Oct. 26, one at Bolivar, Oct. 27, and another at Wellsville, Oct. 28. These meetings are to be addressed by Mrs. David Simpson, a civic worker of Minneapolis, and Allen J. McCurdy, a social worker of New York City.

Mrs. Simpson, the wife of a Supreme Court Judge of Minnesota, is a member of the Minnesota State Conservation Board, and honorary member of the Minneapolis Civic and Commerce Association, (A man's organization). She is now devoting her time to suffrage work as she believes that votes in the hands of women will help to bring about some of the civic improvements for which she has worked.

Mr. McCurdy has had much experience in social work, some of his ideas having been the subject of an article in The Literary Digest a few years ago. He is a clever and humorous speaker and is interested in woman suffrage as a progressive step in carrying out democratic ideals.

These meetings are arranged by the Empire State Campaign Committee of which Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt is president.
