Mr. Hough, up to a short time ago, was unusually active for a man of his years, and prided himself on his ability as a pedestrian. It was nothing uncommon for him in his newspaper work to walk from Rexville to Greenwood, and it took an active youngster to keep pace with him.

The funeral will be held at his late home in Canistota Thursday, and the burial will be at Hornell.

FARM BUREAU WORK

ALLEGANY COUNTY

FARM BUREAU

Last week was discussed the condition of the Bureau and the need of better organization and of a more definite program, any organization can accomplish much more.

The plan of work is to secure in each town a committee of progressive men who will get together and draw up a program of work. Such a meeting is to be held at the Town Hall at Belmont, Monday, October 25th, 11 p. m.

The problems of a county fell under the following heads:

I. Crops—Diseases, poor feed; lack of standardization, poor markets.

II. Dairying—Poor cows, expensive rations, lack of record of performance.

III. Farm—Lack of good management, lack of co-operation.

IV. Soils—Acidity, poor drainage, infertile.

These are suggestive problems. There are others. Consider them. Some of the ways of solving these problems are:

I. Crops—
(a) Crops best adapted to this county. (1.) Variety tests, corn, alfalfa, oats.

(b) More cash crops.
II. Livestock—
(a) Introduction of more pure-breds.

(b) Breeders' Associations—Stock Exchange.
(c) Better feeding.

III. Farm and Community—
(a) More efficient and far-reaching Farm Bureau Organizations.

(b) Efficient Farm Organization by Farm Management Analysis.

IV. Soils—
(a) Increase the use of lime and acid phosphates.

(b) Increase the growth of legumes.

The above is suggestive as a County Program. Look it over and consider whether a good organization could work such a plan. Then come to Belmont, October 25th to help in drawing up such program.

ALFRED SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE SWAMPED WITH NEW STUDENTS

Seventy-five Per Cent Increase Over Last Year

The New York State School of Agriculture opened its seventh year last week with a record breaking attendance, the entering class being larger than last year by nearly 75 per cent. The school long ago outgrew the three buildings originally provided by the State and has rented outside buildings for much of its laboratory work. This year's large entering class makes it imperative that more room be provided. Unless some arrangement can be made for more laboratories and additional instructors, it is doubtful if the usual short Winter courses can be offered this year.

APPLE BORERS

One of the most serious pests of the young orchard are the borers which work in the trunk underneath the bark and seriously injure and often kill the trees. When they have once entered they can only be controlled by digging them out with a knife or killing them by running a wire along the burrow.

It is a good plan to do this in the Fall before freezing weather. After the borers have been dug out the mound and trunk of the tree should be painted with pure white lead and oil paint for about 18 inches above the ground. This will not kill the borers which are already in the trees, but it will serve to prevent the adult insects from laying eggs which later hatch into the borers. The eggs are laid in June and July so it is a good plan to paint the trees in the Fall or Spring.

BARN BURNS WITH FIVE HORSES AT TIP TOP

A barn belonging to F. M. Lee at Tip Top, burned last Friday night. The barn was used by contractor Frank Foote of Nunda for housing his draft horses in use on the construction of the state road. The teamsters had gone to their supper when the fire started, it is supposed from a lantern left hanging near the horses. There were six horses in the building, one of them broke loose and ran out. It was impossible to save the other five as they were surrounded with flames when discovered. Three sets of harness, three tons of hay and a quantity of grain were also burned.

The loss to Mr. Lee is estimated at \$800 with \$300 insurance; to Mr. Foote \$1,200 with no insurance.
