The county will be stocked with deer and elk by the State and a penalty of \$300 is provided for killing an elk or for killing a deer the penalty \$200.

Shall any corporation, association, co-partnership or person be authorized to traffic in liquors under the provisions of sub-division two of section eleven of the Liquor Tax Law, namely, by selling liquor not to be drunk on premises where sold in the town of Andover, N. Y.?

Question 3.—SELLING LIQUOR AS A PHARMACIST ON THE PREMISES WHERE SOLD. Shall any corporation, association, co-partnership, or person be authorized to traffic in liquors under the provisions of sub-division three of section eleven of the Liquor Tax Law, namely, by selling liquor as a pharmacist on premises where sold in the town of Andover, N. Y.?

Question 4.—SELLING LIQUOR BY HOTEL KEEPERS. Shall any corporation, association, co-partnership or person be authorized to traffic in liquors under sub-division one of section eleven of the Liquor Tax Law, but only in connection with the business of keeping a hotel in the town of Andover, N. Y., if the majority of the votes cast on the first question submitted are the negative?

On the 4th day of October at the meeting of the Allegany County Bar Association held at Belmont, the Association authorized the President to appoint a committee to investigate the proposed constitution, which is to be submitted to the electors at the next annual election. The committee was accordingly appointed representing the four political parties in Allegany County County Judge, Elba Reynolds, Republican; Guy C. Hinman, of Angelica, Democrat; Crayton L. Earley, of Andover, Progressive; and Walter T. Bliss, of Bolivar, Prohibition. On the 25th day of October, 1915, the committee met at Belmont and made the following report:

"To the Allegany County Bar Association:

We, the undersigned, committee of your association, have, after carefully considering the merits and demerits of the proposed constitution, regret that it was not submitted to the people by articles, yet we are of opinion that as a whole, the proposed constitution is a great improvement over the present constitution, and therefore recommend its adoption.
