MIDNIGHT ROBBERY AT HAMMONDSPORT

Bath, Nov. 9.—About midnight last night, Alfred Willard, an aged resident of Hammondsport, way waylaid and robbed; the robbery occurred near the ground of the Hammondsport Academy, about \$14 being taken from the person of Mr. Willard.

Mr. Willard gave a fair de- scription of the robber, and the Hammondsport police to-day ar- rested Byron Kennedy at Dun- dee; Kennedy had for some time worked on the Bath-Hammonds- port state road. He was brought to Hammondsport and arraigned before Justice of the Peace Har- ry J. Benner, charged with rob- bery, first degree. Kennedy, up- on arraignment, made a confes- sion, hiding nothing. He was held for the action of the Grand Jury now in session at Hornell. He was brought to the county jail here to-night.

FRIENDSHIP OIL CRAZY
Outside Parties Leasing Property to Put Down Wells

H. A. Kaufman of Dan- ville, Pa., representing Wilkes- barre capitalists, has leased 446 acres below town and will put down a test well on the How bridge farm, within thirty days. This property is on a direct line with the wells now being put down by D. J. Dougherty on the McCarthy place.

Parties have been here from Bradford, Olean, Jamestown and other places and air express them- selves as favorably impressed with the prospects.

Mr. Kaufman has been in Friendship the past month, with A. A. Levey, and during his stay here has been looking over the situation and the lay of the land and is very enthusiastic over the prospects of oil in this vicinity.

This property is also in the same vein with the lease upon which John and Claude Runyan of Bolivar have recently complet- ed a well that is reported to be good for 10 barrels a day. The Bolivar Breeze stated last week that it would not be surprising if this well would continue at a 10-barrel gait for some time.

We sincerely hope that these men may be successful in their venture here.—Friendship Regis- ter.

USE WATER COLOR PAINTS TO RAISE BILL, \$5 TO \$20

Olean, Nov. 9. — (Special) — Thomas Turner, deputy United States marshal, was in the city last night looking for evidence in cases which have come to the attention of the police here in the past few days. Yesterday and last night Thomas Whitton of the Doterweich Brewing Com- pany, Fred Gleason of the firm of Feltham & Gleason, and Samuel Conway, a local saloon-keep- er, each received \$20 bills which afterward proved to have been raised \$5, the raising having been done with water color paints in a clever manner.

Two of these have been traced to one place and it is said that several smaller pieces of money in silver have also been traced to the same locality, which is now suspected of being a fence. The United States officer left to-day for Buffalo with some of the spurious coin and it is said will return to-morrow with another officer, at which time it is ex- pected that the local police will have some more developments for them to work on.
