German militarism is costing not only Germany, her allies and her enemies untold misery and expense, but it is also costing neutral nations as well for in view of Germany's acts toward her weaker and unoffending neighbors it has forced all nations to raise vast sums of money and war material and vast armies for self protection and it has been too often shown that the world's greatest military power, has no respect for the rights of a weaker or unprepared neighbor as shown by the invasion and despoliation of Belgium, The United States without adequate preparation for defense, would be inviting attack from crafty and heavily armed nations of Europe who want to extend their densely populated borders and our great wealth is our great source of danger and a tempting prize for monarchial rulers, ambitious to dominate the world and should the Triple Entente lose in the present war our danger would be great. Mr. Bryan's reliance on the justness of our position would avail us nothing. A war making power, if it has no excuse for an attack can readily make one.

What would our present army of 100,000 men scattered over half a continent be able to accomplish against trained armies numbering millions, and this is the condition by which German militarism is forcing the heavy cost of preparation for necessary defense upon this and other governments by her mighty armaments and trained armies. It will probably cost our people hundreds of millions of dollars a year in the future to properly prepare, not for aggression but for safety of free government.

England, Russia and France were peacefully inclined and unprepared and are now paying dearly for their short-sightedness, while Germany was making guns and munitions, building military roads and training soldiers. All Europe will have to go into training at the close of the war, and the United States probably will never be able to exist again with as light military burdens as in the past and this is all brought about by the pace set by German militarism.

The German people, who aside from the military rulers, are a great and good people, have to suffer and bear their share of the burden with the people of other nations, but a great crime rests on the shoulders of those who are diverting the labor and wealth of the world from the avenues of peace to the destructive purposes of war to satisfy the greedy ambitions of military despots. The only remedy that would lead to individual disarmament would be an international army or police force composed of men from all countries, governed by laws of an international congress in which congress all international disputes should be referred for arbitration. Until then a large part of the energy of man must be devoted to preparation for war.
