THIS WELL COMES BACK

Old Gusher at Eldred, Pa., Giving 50 Barrels a Day Now Kane, Pa., Nov. 9.—The town of Eldred is greatly excited over a gusher which has been found by the Progressive Oil Company. The company recently leased 1,000 acres of land near Eldred for drilling purposes on which was located an old well which had been plugged 30 years ago as it was a poor producer. On Saturday the owners of the well decided to give the old well another test and when the plug was forced down the well began to flow at a rate estimated at 50 barrels a day. To-day over 50 barrels of oil were bailed from the well and as rapidly as the oil was taken out the well would fill again. The striking of the great gusher at a time when Pennsylvania crude oil is selling at \$1.85 a barrel and \$2 oil is predicted has caused many other wells to be drilled in the Eldred field.

TO RETIRE MR. BARNES NOW

League Determined Wage War of Political Armament Against Republican Leader. Watch the Saloon.

Anti-Saloon League of New York respectfully advises the Republican Party to retire Mr. Barnes, Jr., as its representative on the National Republican Committee before he ruins party in this state. Whatever party does, the League does, as a result of the big gains in recent legislative, congressional and no-license elections in New York State, that the time has come to declare war on Mr. Barnes in which quarter will be given nor asked until he is permanently eliminated. ACQUAINTANCE as well as ostensible ally, any position of political power in New York, because he is in himself the discredited principles and gath-erings himself the vicious, stupid, arrogant political interests are withholding the people of self-government on our question.

Anti-Saloon League opposes Mr. Barnes not because he is a political machinist whose political power is based upon the election of the most vicious element of society and the most selfish special interest, but because his political influence has been consistently exerted in behalf of the liquor traffic, is an enemy to the passage of general prohibition legislation on the liquor question in New York. It is popularly supposed that the greatest hindrance to prohibition in New York is Tammany, but Tammany cannot be the goods if deprived of the fact allies in the Republic. The influence of Tammany has been thrown with any on this question when Tammany needed it and the man of the Excise Committee Mr. Barnes own county many helped furnish Tammany the votes necessary to prohibit liquor traffic during the sessions.

of the most grotesque and vulgar jokes in recent political history is the attempt of the saloon crowd to interpret the will of the constitution which blowers Knickerbocker because Mr. Barnes had not been allowed to be as bad as he desired, notwithstanding the effect of the same verdict and an invitation to "come back." The truth is that many of the decent, independent unbossed element of the State opposed the Constitution because Mr. Barnes had been so prominent in framing it, and because they suspected that the Constitutional Convention in applying turning him down was indulging in a piece of deals for public consumption in addition to his political career. Mr. Barnes through his parasitic bitterly opposed prohibition. Judging from his own mouth he believes a liquor license is a property right and is sacred. There is abundant evidence that the Barnes is now seeking by again the project to enfranchise the voters of the cities of New York State on the liquor question to ride back into power with the party of the frantic brewery saloon interests. The New York Republican organization has a chance to save the party from embarrassment and to prove its good faith by hanging up a sign that says "BLACK HAS CHANGED HIS MIND." If New York Republicans lack the intelligence and character to do this, the party nationally must prove itself by not supporting Mr. Barnes unless it wants to authorize that great body of decent members who feel that it is time to divorce party from
