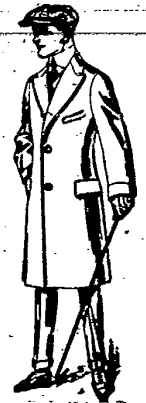
GOWN GORIP.

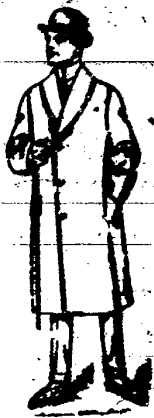
