POST OFFICE IS BURNED

Fire of Unknown Origin Destroys
Rexville Postoffice and the O'Hargan General Store

Canisteo, Nov. 18.—The two story wooden frame building occupied by the postoffice and the O'Hargan general store and the living apartments of James Murray, at Rexville was burned to the ground early this morning, by fire of unknown origin.

The flames were discovered about 2 o'clock by the Murray family and it is supposed that they originated in the store. The building, however, was a mass of flames soon after the discovery and although a bucket brigade was soon formed it was impossible to save the building.

A small amount of mail matter in the post office which was located in the store, was saved, but the most of it was scorched and burned. The building itself belonged to Mary and Susan O'Hargan who also conduct the store. Mary O'Hargan was also the postmistress. The loss on the building and stock in the store is complete.

The Murray's saved some of their furniture. The flames, however, spread with such rapidity through the building that it was but a few minutes after the fire was discovered before it was in flames all over. The efforts of the bucket brigade, however, saved the adjoining buildings.
