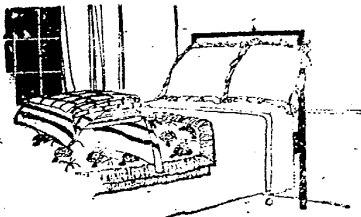

### NOTICE TO SUBSCRIBERS AND PATRONS OF THE ALLEGANY MUTUAL TELEPHONE COMPANY

Owing to the fact that a large number of our subscribers do not understand that we have two different rates on messages between towns where the regular toll rate is fifteen cents, we offer the following explanation.

A "Particular Person Call" is a call on which the calling party has the privilege of designating the particular person with whom he desires to converse. There is no charge for the call unless the desired party, or another party acceptable to the calling party, is obtained.

The charge for a "Particular Person Call" is fifteen cents for a three minute period.

A "Two Number Call" is a call where the calling party is required to give the telephone number of the party called—and a charge is made upon the establishment of the connection regardless of who answers the telephone of the party called. This rate will also be allowed when the calling party states definitely that he wishes to talk (of example) with Mr. Smith's residence at Hornell, and that he will talk with anyone that answers.

The charge for a "Two Number Call" is ten cents for a period of three minutes.

No "Two Number Calls" can be reversed. All reversed calls sent or received will be at the fifteen cent rate.

These rates are in effect with the following named towns, Angelica, Barney Mills, Belmont, Hornell and Wellsville, also any towns where the regular rate is fifteen cents.

All messages of fifteen cents or over are subject to a revenue tax of one cent each, according to the requirements of the U. S. Internal Revenue Tax Laws.
