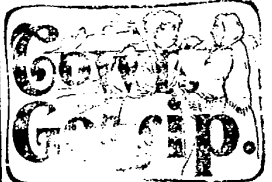

### ST. JAMES HOTEL AT CUBA RAIDED

Raiders Report Finding 56 Bottles of Bear and Jugs of Wine and Brandy

Cuba, Dec. 4.—The St. James Hotel, owned and operated by H. L. VanAuken was raided this morning by representatives of the Cuba No-License and Law Enforcement League. The Rev. E. C. Carder and Fred Lacey prominent workers in the organization, went to Belmont last night and secured search and seizure papers and returned to Cuba this morning.

About 10 o'clock, accompanied by the president of the village, Frank W. Hogg, the principal of the high school, Ford R. Park, Fred Lacey, Herbert Hayes and Chief of Police Norton, they went to the hotel, where they were cordially received by the proprietor who smilingly gave them the freedom of the house and showed them around. They found in the kitchen 55 bottles of what is alleged to be beer and three two-gallon jugs of what competent judges declared to be wine and brandy.

The raid was not entirely unexpected. Members of the No-License League, had they claimed seen wet goods delivered to the hotel that had been shipped in from Pittsburg and had also seen empty cases shipped from Cuba.

The St. James was last raided in September, the closing day of the Cuba Fair. At that time considerably larger quantities of liquor were found.

At present Cuba is, in theory at least, a dry town, but it voted for license last month and will, unless the election should be proved invalid because of illegal voting, go into the wet column beginning next October.

### 85-YEAR-OLD BATH WOMAN

#### IS BURNED TO DEATH

Bath, Dec. 6.—While working near her kitchen stove at her home last night, Mrs. Thomas Quigley's clothing caught fire, and she was so badly burned she died at 3 o'clock this morning.

The sleeve of her dress caught fire and the flames spread to other parts of her clothing. Mrs. Quigley was 80 years of age, and had resided in Bath all her life. She was twice married, first to Mr. Fay, later to Mr. Quigley. She leaves her husband, together with a son, John, in California; three daughters, Mrs. Myron Miller of Bath, Mrs. Katherine Wakefield of Texas, and Miss Minnie Fay, who is a teacher in Iacoma.
