MRS. HARDY GOES TO THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

Teumseh Suffrage Leader Represents Michigan in Congressional Union Convention

Mrs. Jenny Law Hardy, wife of Dr. P. B. Hardy, of Teumseh, Mich., has been in attendance at the First National Convention of Congressional Union, in Washington, D. C. She represents Michigan on the National Board. Mrs. Hardy attended the President's reception given in honor of the envoys from western women who drove from San Francisco to Washington in their own car. This is the first time in history of United States that a President has officially recognized a suffrage organization.

We take the following from the Adrian, Mich., Daily Telegram—Teumseh, Mich., December 3.—Mrs. Jenny Law Hardy left today for Washington, D. C., to attend the first national convention of the Congressional Union. She represents Michigan on the national board, and will be joined by 35 other Michigan women in Washington.

Mrs. Ashbaugh, the president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, Mrs. Jennison of Bay City, Miss Margaret Whittemore, state organizer of the congressional union, Mrs. Breitung, state chairman, and others will be of the party.

Mrs. Hardy, Mrs. Ashbaugh, Mrs. and Miss Whittemore, Mrs. Jennison and Mrs. Hamilton will attend the President's reception given in honor of the envoys from the western women, who drove from San Francisco to Washington in their own car.

It is the first time in the history of the United States that a President has thus officially recognized a suffrage organization, and there could be no greater tribute to the executive power and political ability of the founder and head of the congressional union—Miss Alice Paul.
